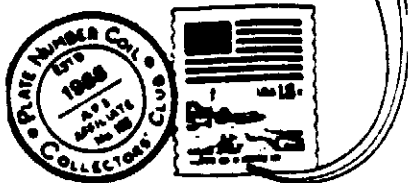

PNC³ Annual Meeting set for Aug. 21 in Houston, TX

New versions of E & S and 23c USA presort make debut

New versions of the Eagle & Shield stamp and the 23c USA presort first-class stamp appeared in May.

The Eagle & Shield was due out May 29 in versions printed by the Bureau of Engraving and Printing and Stamp Venturers, which was also responsible for the 23c USA presort stamp.

The Eagle & Shield stamps were issued in Seacaucus, NJ. The BEP was printing rolls of 3,000, while Stamp Venturers was printing rolls of 10,000. The BEP stamps were to have five plate numbers, while the Stamp Venturers version was to have five numbers preceded by the letter S. The new versions will both read "USA Bulk Rate," while the existing American Bank Note Co. version reads "Bulk Rate USA."

The 23c USA presort was out May 14 in Denver, CO, in rolls of 10,000. There are three plate numbers preceded by the letter S. All of the new stamps were printed by the gravure process. There are slight color variations.

Indigo color variety reported on 29c Flag over White House

The May 24 issue of *Linn's Stamp News* reports the finding of an indigo color variety on the 29c Flag over the White House stamp. The normal color is blue. The article states the color is similar to or darker than the color used on the 24.1c Tandem Bicycle or \$1 Seaplane coil stamps. The article illustrates both the normal and indigo varieties on the front page of the issue.

All of the indigo stamps found as of the date of publication (the Linn's press run was May 13) were plate No. 6 and all had been found in the New York City area. The stamps were purchased by dealer Ron Kronheim of Staten Island, NY in late April and early May on coils of 100 brought to his shop.

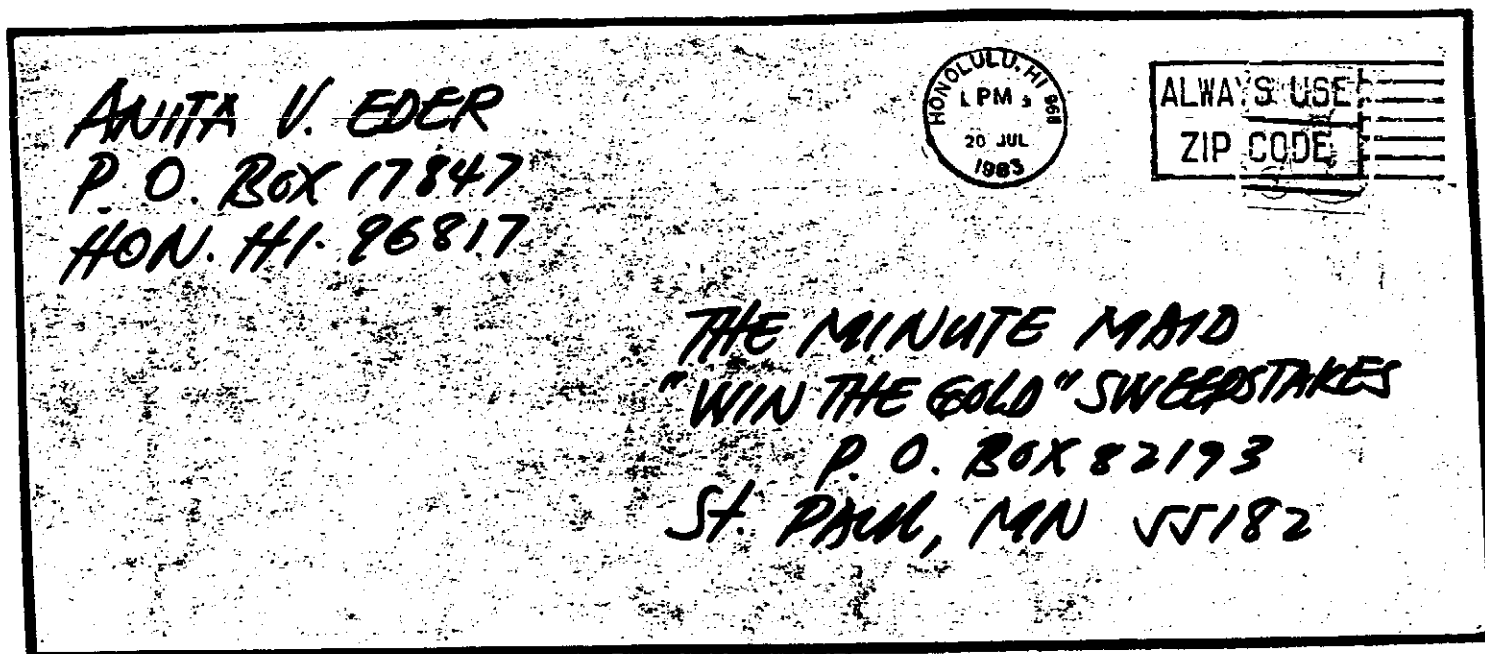

This month's article features the 5.9¢ Bicycle. It was issued on February 17, 1982 in Wheeling, West Virginia. Plate numbers 3 and 4 exist tagged and numbers 3, 4, 5 and 6 exist precancelled. The plate numbers are found every 24 stamps in a roll. 5.9¢ Bicycle coils were issued in order to meet the third class non-profit bulk rate.

The earliest known usages of 5.9¢ Bicycle PNCs on cover are as follows:

<u>Plate Number</u>	<u>Earliest Known Usage on Cover</u>
3 tagged	9/29/82
4 tagged	6/7/82
3 precancelled	6/4/87
4 precancelled	7/20/83
5 precancelled	12/28/87
6 precancelled	12/29/87

All of the EKU covers listed above, except the #4 precancelled, were philatelically prepared. The #4 precancelled EKU cover (pictured below) is the result of someone removing the stamp from a non-profit bulk mail envelope and reusing it on a commercial sweepstakes entry cover.

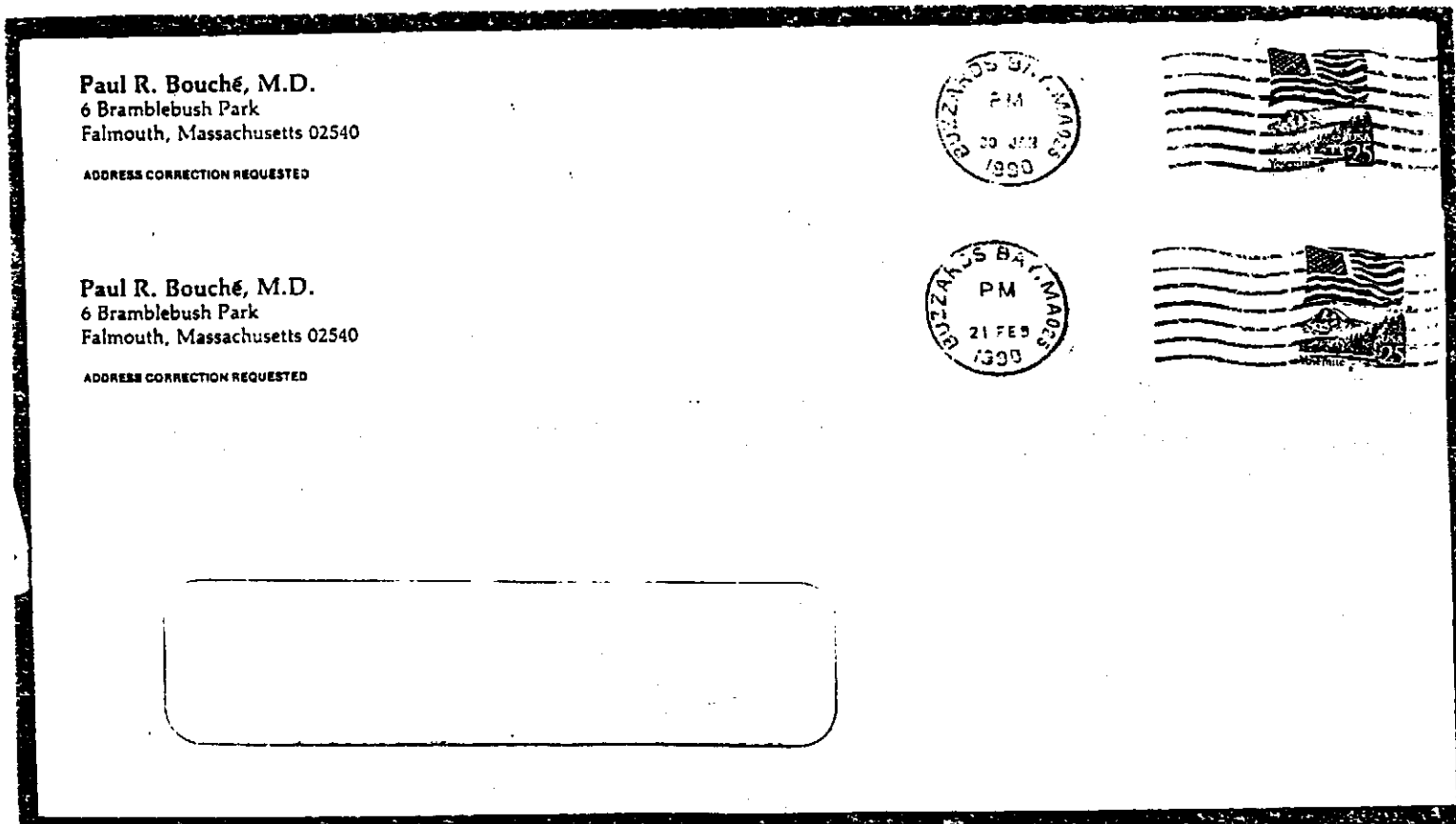


I'm not aware of any known commercial covers using the tagged 5.9¢ Bicycle PNCs. As for the precancelled Bicycle PNCs, very few actual commercial covers have been reported...five #3s, nine #4s, only one #5, and two #6s. Obviously, these are quite scarce, and as such, you can expect to pay at least \$35-\$45 each for #3 and #4 precancelled covers, and at least \$50-\$60 each for #5 and #6 covers.

New EKU cover reports this month are 20¢ Flag #1 (1/2/82), 4.9¢ Buckboard #4 (2/10/86) and 12¢ Stanley Steamer #1 (2/10/86).

Be sure to request a Redwood City Seed Company cover as offered by Craig and Sue Dremann in last month's Coil Line. Requests cannot be made until June 15, 1993. I own a set of covers of the first Redwood City "provisionals", and they are quite impressive. These provisionals have been the subject of some negative philatelic journalism in the past, but Craig's May Coil Line article certainly provides proof that the provisionals were, at least initially, officially authorized by the U.S.P.S. I've had the pleasure of talking with Craig on several occasions, especially in recent months, and I am very pleased that he chose our membership to make this exclusive offer to. Thank you Craig and Sue.

Variable Ramblings

We all know philatelic clerks who are all-around good guys. They bend the rules a little bit, especially if they like you. It's human nature. I think that experience shows us that no two philatelic windows operate under identical rules, even though there is a Philatelic Center Operations Guide which spells out a specific national policy. There are uniform national guidelines, but there is no uniform national implementation of them.

The VRC technicians became instant philatelic clerks, of sorts. They all found themselves dealing with collectors. Some took readily to it; others didn't. When the new program setting 19¢ minimums was sent to the technicians in November, 1992, the Detroit area technician popped his in and never flinched. The Santa Ana, CA technician desperately wanted his new program so as to clear collectors out of the lobby. He didn't receive his until mid-December, but inserted it the same morning he received it.

The Monterey Park, CA technician had his for about three weeks before inserting it. Collectors knew he had it, and knew also that he wanted to hold off a bit. Monterey Park is 26th in the nation in total vending machine sales. The local postmaster takes pride in this, and apparently aspires to move up on the list. During the Christmas rush, the postmaster hung around the lobby coaxing people to the vending machines, and had a wad of bills to change \$20s. He queried the technician about the gross take from every VRC roll, and was not happy when a roll of 3000 netted less than \$100. On Dec. 31, he ordered the technician to re-program. The postmaster is happy that a VRC roll now nets close to \$1000, although consumption of rolls is down from eight per week to less than one.

Washington, D.C. delayed until Jan. 30. A few area residents functioned as dealer-agents. At least one agent had the technician's home phone number, and could get updates on which of the four D.C.-area machines had stamps in them, and what the reloading schedule would be.

One of the best kept secrets was Oklahoma. Apparently Oklahoma City re-programmed to 19¢, but would put the 1¢ program back for short periods of time. Norman, OK re-programmed to 19¢, and then went back to 1¢ for more than a month. Carolyn Murphy, USPS Vending Program Manager, was in town from Washington and popped in to the Norman post office. She was startled to see the machine spitting out one-centers. That was the end of that--the 19¢ program was re-inserted on April 9--but not before some area collectors managed to get a few 1¢-18¢ on the shiny gum paper.

The Norman post office also filled a request in March from

Prairie Dog Trading Company of El Paso, TX for 480 stamps of each denomination, 1¢ through 18¢. Norman postal personnel printed the stamps and Express mailed them to El Paso. At 48-stamp intervals, that is 10 plate strips of each denomination. It took about 3 rolls of 3000 to fill the order. 1¢ to 6¢ was done on one roll of the dry gum printing, but 7¢ to 18¢ were done on two rolls of the shiny gum (second) printing. The 7¢ to 18¢ are badly centered, having been printed from rolls that had been opened previously but not inserted into the machine because local collectors objected to their quality.

Prairie Dog did not realize that they had something of a scarcity--there are very few low denominations in existence from the shiny gum printing. There is no grapevine quite like the PNC grapevine, and six sets were quickly sold at \$350 each before a caller asked a question about which of the denominations had which tagging, and the remaining four sets were withdrawn from sale.

Linn's reported that the Miami Airport machine was printing 1¢ stamps later than April 9, but Carolyn Murphy reports that "this error has been rectified."

In late April, USPS headquarters phoned every technician and asked them the specific history and time frames of their use of the 1¢ and 19¢ programs. Apparently everyone has forgiveness, but absolutely no one has permission. As far as headquarters is concerned, one-centers are dead.

Coil and Box Labels

Coil labels on the first and second printings are identical. Boxes have a 3½x3½ red orange label. The texts are the same, except that the first printing box label has a text warning against sale before the first day which is not present on the label for the second printing. Additionally, boxes of the second printing have a rubber stamped "Feb. 15, 1993" near the label.

Scarcity

The second printing is seven times as large as the first. Consequently, plate strips from the second printing will probably always be more plentiful. Exception: there are fewer than 50 plate strips of 1¢-18¢ from the second printing. Barring a change in USPS programming policy, that is all there will be.

Untagged 19c Fishing Boat A5555 Cam Taylor found in the trash at Brighton, MI in early March that was 'discovered' at Plymouth show.

Postcard sent by Joann Lenz to Coil Line Editor Harold Brown. The untagged Fishing Boat stamp was handcancelled, probably locally.

Another postcard sent by Joann Lenz to CL Editor, this one with a small piece of tagged (highlighted) selvage to see if it would get cancelled. It did.

As the June issue of Coil Line was being completed, over 30 untagged rolls of the 19c Fishing Boat had been reported found across the country.

Jerry Miller in South Carolina appears to have found the biggest group at 18 rolls of 500. Other finds have been reported from the Detroit area, St. Louis and in Florida.

All are plate A5555.

At the Regional Meeting April 24 in Plymouth, MI, it was the opinion of Wayne Youngblood of Scott's Stamp Monthly that the reason for the untagged version was that the stamp was printed on the same paper used to print the Eagle & Shield stamps. Wayne gave a comprehensive program at the meeting on stamp luminescence.

After the meeting a group of members was sitting around tables sharing stamps and stories when Cam Taylor of Brighton, MI, got to looking at a postcard she had found dumpster diving. It had an A5555 plate number. She had originally earmarked it as a door prize but it was returned to her after the meeting because of an abundance of things members had brought along to offer as prizes. Sure enough, the stamp was untagged.

With reports of more finds a fairly regular occurrence on the editor's phone in the past 10 days, it's a buyer beware market. There could be lots of this variety, then again, we may have found most of it. You pay your money and take your chances.

Coil Line taken to the woodshed for printing Redwood city story

Philatelic Writer and PNC member Ken Lawrence took *Coil Line* to task in his Plate Number Coils column in the May 24 issue of *Linn's Stamp News* for publishing Craig Dremman's article about the Redwood City Postmaster Provisionals. Lawrence said the issue "recycled the fanciful tale."

"It is unfortunate that *Coil Line* gave Dremman what amounts to three pages of free advertising space, without at least mentioning that postal regulations forbid such antics." He also mentions a version of the story, which appeared in Linn's "Plate Number Coil Handbook," which he authored, and an article in the May 1990 issue of *The Plate Number*, published by Steve Esrati.

Charles Vukotich III is successful exhibitor at 11

Janet also enclosed a color photo of the young man proudly standing next to his exhibit with an award. Too bad everyone can't see the big smile on his face. The following is a note from Janet:

"In the May newsletter you asked if anyone had seen Charles Vukotich III at Milcopex. I can't believe anyone would as he lives here in Pittsburgh. I'm happy to say he's one of mine. I used to have several Ben Franklin Clubs at lunchtime for area schools when 'Chaz,' as he likes to be called, transferred to a private school. I kept him as a single exhibitor. I'm always looking for exhibits for Wilpex and Pittpex and Chaz never lets me down. The following is a statistical report on PNC commercial covers found for the period April 19 to May 7, from the national ladies wear mail order company in Tucson, AZ.

29c Flag/White House: 1-21; 2-02; 3-36; 4-60; 5-01; 6-124; 7-148; 8-92.

29c Flag/Mt. Rushmore: 1-08; 2-00; 3-04; 4-02; 5-00; 6-00; 7-08; 8-00; 9-00.

Previous conclusions are confirmed as still valid. Plate numbers 2 and 5 of the White House are still scarce on commercial covers. Ed. Choate provided a copy of a great #5 true commercial cover. I would like to hear from any PNC3 members who have found current .29 rate hard to find PNC commercial covers. Get those Mt. Rushmore covers into your collection, especially Nos. 5, 8 & 9.

Instead of the number found he will report the Zip Code from the return address, and lacking that, will use as much of the cancellation as he can read.

Highlights of the meeting were presentations by Wayne Youngblood of Scott's Stamp Monthly on tagging and by Ron Maifeld on "The Magic of PNCs." Both are members. Ron recently retired from the U.S. Postal Service and is a magician of lengthy experience.

Wayne used a slide show to illustrate tagging on many different stamps both U.S. and foreign. There was a lot of discussion among the group and the program had to be cut short to allow the next group to use the meeting room.

There were cafeteria tables nearby and several members of the group sat around sharing stories, information and being generally sociable until late afternoon.

Kurt Lenz, Joann's husband, who says he doesn't collect but knows more than a lot of folks about PNCs and tagging, volunteered to take anyone to the downtown Detroit Post Office to visit the VRC machine. He'd also done this on Friday and had a couple of takers. Wayne Youngblood and editor Brown were the only two to make the trip Saturday afternoon.

We were shown all the ropes about finding the post office, filled in on the parking, which was convenient, and introduced to the machine. If you ever go to downtown Detroit to see a Tiger game, the post office is just a few blocks away. It's also close by Joe Lewis Arena. Those downtown for other than sporting pursuits should also take some time and their change to visit the machine.

On the way back to Plymouth, Kurt took us to the Hispanic neighborhood. Wayne was looking for a special brand of hot sauce, which he found in a bakery. We also bought some samples of the baked goods. They weren't spicy but were excellent. It's fun to roam around the city if you have a willing guide who knows the highlights like Kurt.
