A message from the President:

Who will do it if we don't?

At the last Annual Meeting, much of the discussion period was given over to the need for more research into PNC related topics. It was driven by the discussion of tagging types and paper coatings. Members may wish to refer back to last fall's *Coil Lines* to refresh their memories on specifics, but let me just say now that I have heard little from our members that there is serious study under way on these or other topics.

Let's hear from the membership regarding the type of studies they are interested in, whether from the standpoint of things they themselves are doing, or about topics they are interested in knowing more about. If you are doing a study of any sort, whether simple or highly detailed, drop Harold Brown a note explaining what you're doing.

If you have an idea about a topic needing more study, communicate that as well. I'm sure Harold will be glad to summarize the information in a future issue. If we get sufficient response, we will list contact points in a column each month on topics currently under study. That way, members can know where to go for more information and to contribute information they may wish to share.

Current activities include reports of PNCs found on commercial mail by reporters in various places around the country. This has been one of the most visible data gathering projects, with reports published each month and a summary report published periodically. This is a loosely organized study group, with yeoman service by Dick Koenig, Dan Kauffman, and many others over the last few years, and is an example of the kind of progress we can make if many persons contribute.

Last fall, Ken Moreau indicated an interest in tagging breaks. There has been much work done in the past on this topic and could prove a fruitful ground for more detailed study. John Larimer has been keeping us informed

of the availability of back numbers, through periodic updates of his chart of back numbers.

There are many other examples, but you get my point. These are all valuable contributions to the PNC specialty, but it's clear we are not doing enough to document the specialty aspects of PNCs. If we don't do it, who will?

The Flag Over Porch issue is a good example. Alan Thomson did an excellent summary in Snippets in the February issue of *Coil Line*, but there are literally dozens of areas where more work could be done to enhance our knowledge of this and other PNCs.

For example, who knows the relative availability of the different peak and valley combinations for the FOPs? Other than the recent census on the "escapes" by Jim Fowler, I haven't heard of any kind of survey or study on any of the incision styles. Is FOP S/A #66666 11/10 easier to find in type A or type B? How many used examples of the "split" 5-5555 have been located with only the single digit on the stamp? How many with the four? The mixture sorters out there probably have this information, but it needs to be tabulated and shared.

I'd like the club to publish a guide for exhibit judges, and it would be nice if we could include some information on the truly difficult PNC material. Judges cannot know of the challenges PNCs offer unless we tell them.

If we fail to develop the information for use by ourselves and others, we are doing ourselves and our collecting specialty a serious injustice. Without more information, PNCs could continue to be treated as a modern specialty not worthy of serious judging interest. Comprehensive, collector-inspired surveys and sharing can provide the needed data to correct this unfortunate situation.

The members of the original PNC Study Group, which disbanded some years ago, devoted their time and energy to the identification and tabulation of a lot of information on the various aspects of PNCs. Some have taken up collecting challenges outside PNCs. Others are currently devoting their efforts to the club in other ways. Some may be continuing their efforts, but have not communicated widely through the club medium, *Coil Line*.

We'd like to see and hear more from these and others. BIA (shortly to be changing their name to the United States Stamp Society) has many study groups within their organization, each involved in increasing and promoting the knowledge of their specialty areas. Should we not be doing the same thing as the PNC3 organization? If we don't do it, who will? I invite correspondence from interested parties, either privately or (preferably) in the open forum of *Coil Line*.

New commercial cover reports from East

To the Editor:

The following PNC commercial cover report is the first in a series of what will be regular compilation made possible the joint efforts of PNC members Charles Eson and Bruce Menia. The covers were taken from 275 lbs. Of a telephone utility with cancellation dates from January 19 through February 12, 2000. Most are from small and medium size cities in the Northeast, with some covers from the Atlantic area.

At an estimated 160 covers per pound, approximately 44,000 covers were reviewed to find the following issues and numbers.

Berries - B1111-28; B1112-34; B2211-56; B2221-9; B2222-16.

'H' WA - 1111.

'H' SA - 1111-2; 2222-7; 3333-6.

Flag over City WA - 1111-7.

Flag over City SA - 1111-3; 2222-5; 3333-5; 4433-2; 4443-2; 4444-4; 5555-24; 6666-14; 7777-43; 8888-77; 9999-47.

Booklet Flag over City - V1111-10; V2212-45.

Miscellaneous coils - 5. Total covers 0 396.

There were two FOP PNCs found. Along with the small number of Hats found it would appear the rate change did not cause an abundant use of left over postage. The 4s on the FOC appear scarce. It may be interesting to see how many of these appear in later reports.

Booklet plate numbers should not be overlooked as collectors who wish to reconstruct various booklet issues will require the plate numbers for completion.

Bruce found several hats, without numbers, with the grey-green brim color variety. Should you find one WITH a number please report it so it can be determined what plates have this variety. We also enjoy finding PNCs with pictorial cancellations, of which only two were found in this search.

If members want this information reported, we would like some feedback, as well as any other vitals you may wish us to look for and report to the membership.

Sort through used stash of FOPs pays off

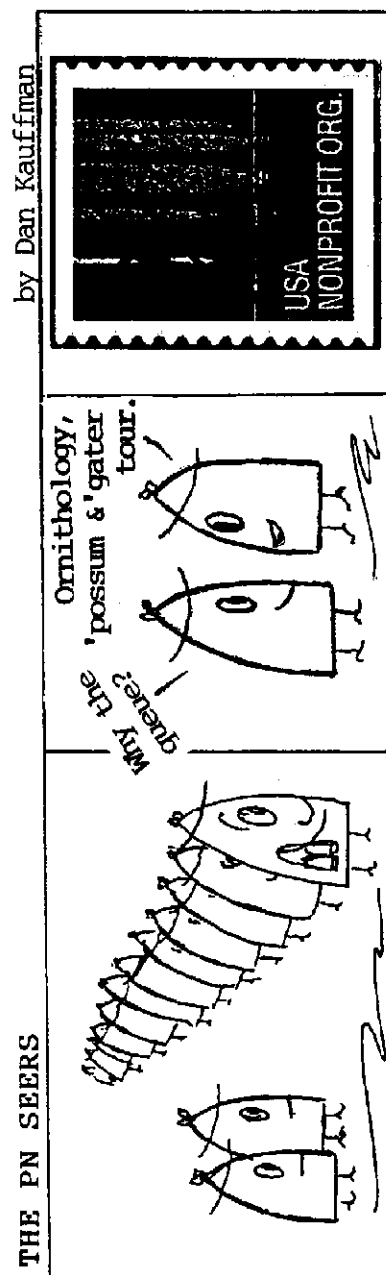
To the Editor:

I had the chance recently to go through a non-member's unsorted stash of FOP 99999's. Of the 269 11/10s there were 6 for the 9.9999 variety and of the 501 10/10s there was 1 of the 9.9999 variety.

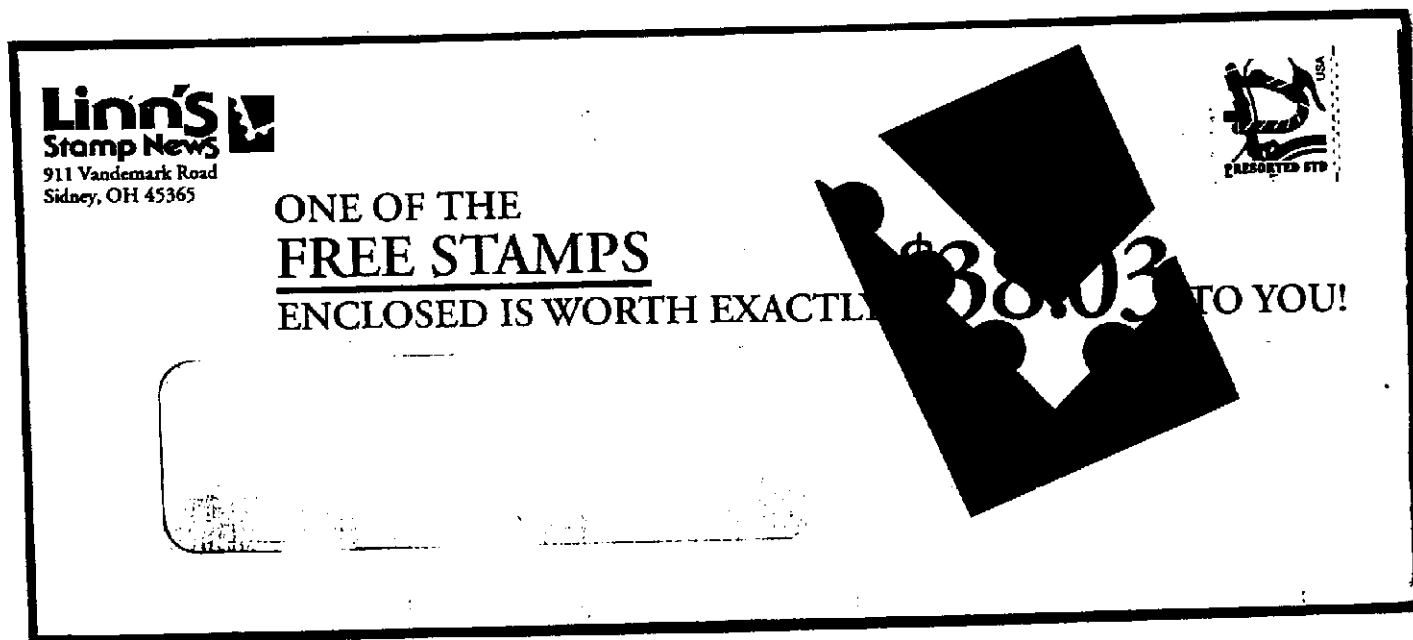
The reason for the low percentage of this constant plate variety is because the BEP used more than one set of 99999 plates and only one of the plates had the flaw. It may also be that this plate did not develop this flaw until it had been used for some time.

I also checked several dozen of the 11/10s to see if any had the style B incision (not reported in Richard Nazar's last update in February issue) and found none.

New Numbers

There are four new numbers this month. Finally BEP has broken out of the logjam and has used the "A" suffix on a new City Flag number. Number 1111A has been found in rolls of 100. After being reported many months ago as having been printed, [REDACTED]

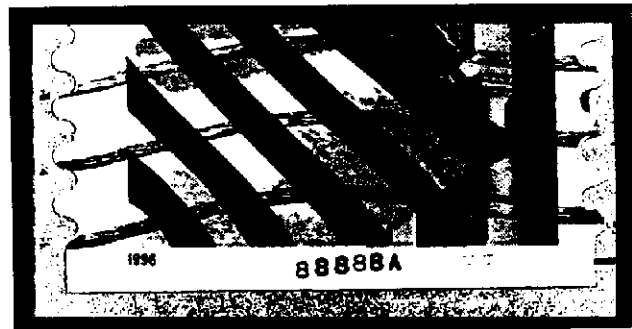
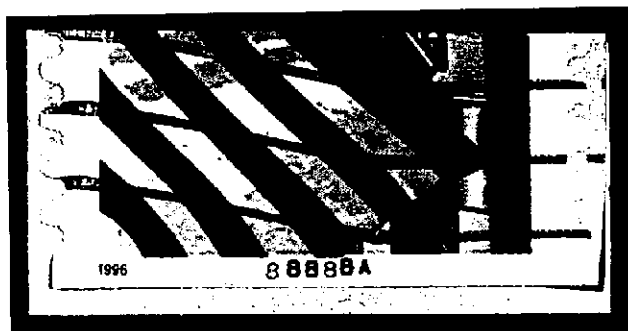
[REDACTED] It should be, as both printings are from the "F" press. The PSA Diner has two new numbers, #33333 and #44444.

Sixth FOP "Hopper" Found

Prompted by the Flag Over Porch article in the February issue of *Coil Line*, Jeff Fiszbain has reported finding a used example of cylinder combination 99999 where the second digit (light blue) has hopped over the first digit (tan). Of course the number order of 99999 is still 99999 but the colors of those nines are out of proper sequence.

High and Low 8's on FOP

The Flag Over the Porch PSA coil just isn't going to go away when it comes to finding new types and collectible strips. Rich Nazar discovered that there are two distinctly different plate number locations on #88888A. This is the same sort of thing that was found on the HAT #1111 coil which were named Hi Black 1 and Low Black 1. In the case of the Flag stamp the difference in distance of the plate number from the design is most easily seen by comparing the distance of the red digit (the fourth) to the third red stripe in the flag. The high red 8 almost touches the red stripe while the low 8 type is significantly farther away. Since we are comparing the distance of the number to red in the image, the variance cannot be due to cylinder positioning on the press. Although cylinder manufacture records do not show that two sets of #8 cylinders were made, that obviously is the case. In the photocopies below the high 8's are shown in the top photo and the low 8's in the bottom photo.



Slide Show Update

Richard Beecher has taken on the job of updating the Club's PNC slide show. He hasn't indicated a completion date, but when finished it certainly will be a welcome improvement to a presentation that was made many years ago. A great deal of material has been added to the list of known PNC's since. Stamp production methods have changed radically.

More Kestrel "Punctuation"

Another "punctuation" plate variety has been found on a 1¢ Kestrel coil. This time it appears on the original printing from the "D" press. It's on the [REDACTED] color set [REDACTED] and is a black "period" between the black and yellow 1's. David Andrews found two covers that have the mark. The first reported markings (See Snippets in Nov 99 Coil Line) came from the Optiforma printed [REDACTED] and had both a red and a blue colon in the plate number. -- And speaking of the original, there seems to be very little interest in it as a CPV. I wonder why the Porch Flag 9.9999 has been so widely sought and has reached such lofty price heights in both strip and used single form, while the Kestrel Colours haven't caught on.

Cog Railway Plate Variety

Jim Nelson has found a constant plate variety on the Cog Railway #1 in a roll of 500 that he bought some time ago. He calls it an "egg" and it appears on each stamp that is in the 6L position in relation to the plate number stamps. The numbered stamp is 1L. The oval spot of green ink is directly below the trestle support and is easily seen in the photocopy below.



New Kestrel Plate Variety

New member applicant Charles Weis has reported a new Kestrel CPV that appears on the second printing; the Optiforma press run with the color sequence of BCYM (TypeII). The C-spot on the bird's back is on the 4R stamp and shows well in the photo below.

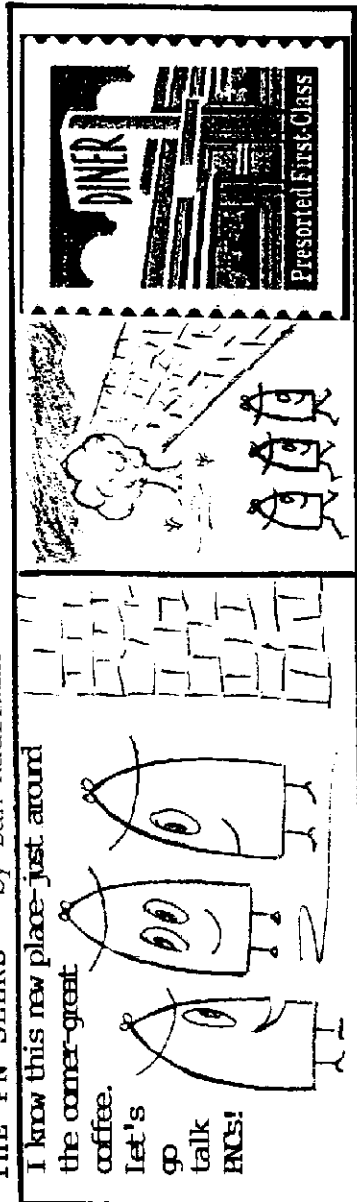
