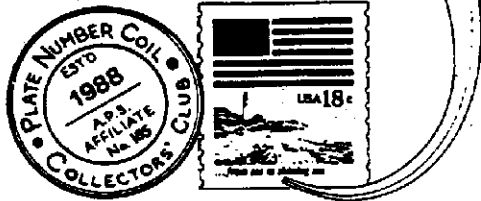

Just to let you know, my coil collecting interest is mint PNC8 (the PN on the 4th stamp from the left). For those coils without plate numbers, it is still in strips of eight with the line in the middle. This has not previously appeared in the members' collecting interest compilation.

I store the strips in Lighthouse albums of 64 pages (32 leaves) with clear interleaves and clear pockets (just right for strips of eight) against a matte black background.

I also collect full sheets and booklet panes. My specialty is US, although I am also interested in Cuba and world wide, pre-1940, bi-color, vignette black.

Thick and Thin FOP Numbers

The style of the cylinder digits on the Flag Over the Porch water activated gum (WAG) coils with combination number 22222 seems to be a nagging question. Why are some thick and some thin? In one respect the answer is very straightforward.

Before we go too far, however, it should be pointed out that the condition is not confined to #22222, because it also occurs on #11111.

For those unfamiliar with the situation, collectors have observed that stamps from coils of 100 of the WAG FOP have thick cylinder digits and those from rolls of 500 or 3,000 have very thin digits. These two styles were not printed by the same set of cylinders.

Rolls of 100 came from a set that had 20 rows of stamps and were 24 stamps around the printing cylinder for a single impression total of 480 images. Larger rolls were printed by cylinders that had 18 rows and an image circumference of 24 for a single impression total of 432.

There is a good reason for using two different sizes of cylinders, and it is the capacity of the machines that process the printed web into coils. The equipment that makes rolls of 100 can handle a maximum width of 20 rows. The machinery that makes larger rolls can only handle webs with an image width of 18 rows. You may ask, "Why not just make all the webs 18 rows, then either machine could be used?" It's a matter of economics. Forty-eight stamps are lost with each revolution (impression) of the press if only 18 rows are used on webs destined to become rolls of 100. It's more economical to make two sets of cylinders.

The fact that the different digits are the result of different cylinders is the easy part of the explanation. The part that's difficult is why were different styles used rather than sticking with one style no matter what the size of the cylinders. We don't have the answer to that question.

Even though it appears to us collectors that there is a reuse of cylinder numbers involved here, from BEP's viewpoint there isn't. BEP plate number guidelines are such that any time there is a change in format (480 and 432 images) for cylinders or sleeves for a given issue, the plate number suffix numbering starts over again. Thus in the case at hand we have more than one collectible version of the same number.

If something else besides the digit size is also different, such as gum, our number of collectible strips starts to grow. This is what happened with #11111 and #22222. Two numbers turned into five collectible strips, or four PNC singles if you are a used collector.

Here is a recap of the five different strips:

- #11111 - rolls of 100, thick digits and gloss gum
rolls of 500 & 3,000, thin digits and shiny gum
- #22222 - rolls of 100, thick digits and gloss gum
rolls of 500, thin digits and gloss gum
rolls of 3,000, thin digits and shiny gum

For the used collector (no gum involved), stamps from #22222 in both large rolls are the same.

Stick with us through thick and thin, and enjoy your hobby more by understanding the whys and wherefores.

New Numbers

City Flag #4444A is the only new plate number this month.

Eagle & Shield Back Numbers all 0000

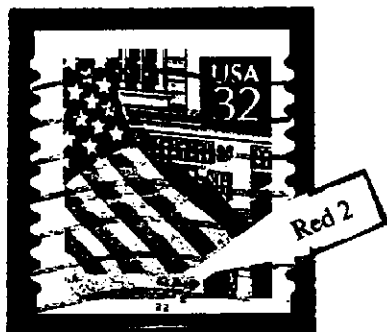
A roll of 3,000 of the revised PSA E&S bearing cylinder combination #1111 has been found by Brian Engler where all the back numbers are 0000. The zeros are in aqua color ink and in the top position. Brian asked the clerk if they are considered by USPS to be faulty stamps and was told that such stamps are destroyed if found. Mass mailers get upset if the back numbering is not accurate.

Die Cut Omitted on FOC #6666

While sorting covers David Andrews spotted a die cut omitted City Flag PSA coil. He contacted the mailer and was able to buy the remaining 82 stamps on the roll. There were three plate number strips left. Dave's report prompted me to contact imperforate specialist John Greenwood to see if this was a new find and to get a full report of the City Flag numbers found thus far with the die cutting omitted. John provided this list: #1111, #6666, #7777, #8888 and #9999.

FOP Numbers in the Design

The mixture sorters are still finding interesting freaks on the Porch Flag coils. Jeff Fiszbein sent the #22222 stamp pictured below in which the red 2 is located 3mm up into the vignette, causing the red stripes in the flag to be equally high. The brown 2 is also high with half the digit up in the design. There are red stripes in the blue field of stars and part of the brown printing protrudes from the top of the stamp.



Chocolate Brown Eagle

Apparently one printing of the new USA Presorted Std Eagle and Shield has a different colored bird on it than we are used to. Ken Moreau received some strips from rolls of 10,000 at the KC cave and they are a chocolate brown rather than the normal golden brown. Dave Cockrill also reported receiving some from the same source. It appears that this color variety is the result of contaminated brown ink. It's possible that red ink was added to the brown ink trough creating the chocolate color. The first color station during printing for these stamps is red and the last station is brown. Perhaps a pressman got confused and went to the wrong end of the line with a new supply of red ink.

Missing Yellow

Several people reported they had found copies of the City Flag PSA coil with the yellow digit missing in the plate number. In all cases but one that difficult to read yellow was there, sometimes displaced to the left which made it even harder to find. Dan Forgues, however, did find a copy of (55)55 on which both the yellow and aqua digits were left uninked. All the colors are in the design and correctly positioned. Just the two numbers lack ink.



Small Hole Perf on 20¢ Flag #14

Another plate number from the Flag Over Supreme Court has been found with small perforation holes. Fred White checked his collection and found the #14 strip shown below. Fred included a comparison strip of #13 which has large holes.



El Dorado Flag

Most City Flag coils have buildings that seem to be sandy yellow in color. David Andrews has found 17 covers with buildings that are a distinct gold color. One cover fortunately had a plate number of 1111A. These stamps are not changlings and after examining the numbered stamp to be sure the yellow plate number appeared to be the correct shade I tend to believe the red ink that was used is contaminated with a darker color. The flag stripes are much darker than normal and the red shading in the buildings seems heavy and dark. The effect is a nonmetallic gold. The covers have rather diverse points of origin, including Wilkes Barre, PA; Macon, GA; and St Petersburg, FL. Check your 1111A strips by comparing to others. The stand alone gold color doesn't strike the eye as different.
