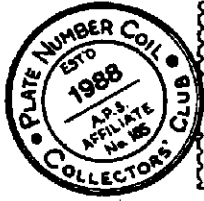

## Dues to increase for 2002

Many, if not most, members are aware that the Postal Service is once again planning for another rate increase.

This next increase is likely to be larger than the previous few increases, and is expected to significantly increase our costs in distributing *Coil Line*. The Board has also approved some new programs to reach out for new members and improve the services we offer our current members.

The resulting increases in costs necessitate an increase in our annual dues. We have been fortunate that we have been able to hold the line on our dues since the beginning of the club in 1988. This is due especially to the fiscal vigilance of our Coil Line Distribution Manager, Alan Thomson, who has worked hard to hold costs down.

As you might suspect, the preparation and mailing costs associated with *Coil Line* are by far our largest expense. Alan can only do so much in the face of rising postage costs, however.

Annual dues will henceforth increase by \$2, to \$12 for domestic members. Foreign memberships will also increase \$2. Life Memberships (for those who qualify) will rise to \$120. Other fees (application fee, reinstatement fee, etc.) will remain unchanged.

Attached to the front of this issue you will find the dues renewal form reflecting the new dues structure.

All members are urged to renew before the end of the year to avoid the reinstatement fee. Don't delay, take care of it now.

## Planning for the future

During the annual PNC3 meeting it was brought up that 2006 will be the 25th anniversary of PNCs as well as the year there will be a major international stamp show in Washington, D.C.

If anyone in our club has any pull with the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, it would be great if the BEP came up with an exhibit featuring some of the original artwork, etc., for the 1981 issues.

Speaking of exhibits, it is probably not too early to start working on an exhibit of PNCs for that show, as it will take time to track down elusive items, learn what judges want and to react to that.

It is probably also not too early to start mentioning to your spouse that you want to go to the show.

It would be great if they issued one or more coil stamps at the show and since they decide these things far in advance of the issue date, it is not too soon to lobby.

They have a policy that they won't put out a design that explicitly honors the 25th anniversary of anything, but it would be great if they came out with a new transportation design (for instance, hot air balloon, covered bridge, snowshoe or skis and poles, ice or roller skates) or one of the 1981 designs revalued to a 2006 rate. Ideally it would be engraved instead of gravure, and if they complain about the cost of an engraved stamp, they could make it a 2 ounce rate or an overseas airmail rate.

Another option would be a Franklin stamp (it will

# Group studies Bison serial control numbers

A study is being made for the serial control number appearing on the reverse of the 21c Bison coil.

The serial control number is 3/4-inch wide, consisting of 9 digits. Theoretically, it can fit into one single stamp, which is 7/8-inch wide, making the so-called # on # possible.

As demonstrated in the chart, the following information is needed for the study:

9-digit control # (1)	First digit position (2)	length (3)	Last digit position (4)	length (5)	roll position (6)
000733291	1 Left	4.0	PN	5.0	1
001406541	1 Left	5.0	PN	4.0	na

- 1) What is the 9-digit serial control number you have? (e.g. 000733291)
- 2) Which stamp does the first digit fall on relative to the nearest plate number (PN)? (2L, 1L, PN, 1R, 2R)
- 3) How many digits fall into this stamp (decimal possible)?
- 4) Which stamp does the last digit fall on relative to the nearest plate number? (See example on 2)
- 5) How many digits fall into this decimal stamp (decimal possible)?
- 6) Which stamp does the last digit fall on, if available, relative to the right end of the roll?

Any member who supplies data from the control numbers will receive a report of the study.

## Comments on postmark permit number

The June "Snippets" depicted a Wetlands stamp sporting a large number at the bottom of it. A query as to its origin and purpose was made therein.

In the September issue, Dick Koenig offered an answer of a Postmark Permit number which seemed to satisfy the question.

I disagree with the hypothesis, its conclusion and acceptance.

Because a permit to self-cancel is issued by a local Postmaster, certain USPS rules must be followed. A sample cancel must be attached to the permit application and must conform closely to an accepted standard such as that depicted in those rules. Mailer's Postmark Permits are numbered according to their receipt at their Post Office, normally within the 3 digit range, and carry that number and legend as evidence of the permit amid the killer bars, along with a normal CDS with information of City, State, Date and Zip.

As the canceling devices are generally produced by companies supplying rubber stamps or dies, they tend to be porous, thicker, and less crisp than the example. As the cancel is applied, not only is the number in evidence, but other markings of the cancel would also appear - unless a deliberate effort was made to confuse or amuse.

In view of the above, the question still remains an open one in my mind. Although I can conceive many ways which it could have been made to appear, I am hesitant to accept an MPP number as a causal and resultant source.

It would be interesting to tax the Mailer's Postmark Club with their theories! Or anyone else with thoughts in opposition to mine explaining the five digit number and unusual clean appearance.

## New Numbers

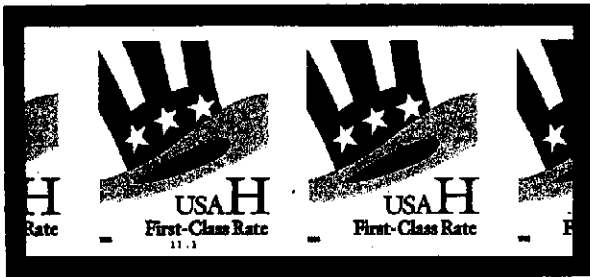
We have three new numbers this month. B2211 from the Flowers coil is new along with V2222 of the 21¢ Bison post card stamp. The rate change stamps include the 23¢ George Washington coil with number B11.

## Bison PBN Report

No one has been able to challenge the low production back number that has been reported the last two or three months. The high number keeps changing hands and is now 1842787. It will probably continue to get bigger because, as Doug Iams reports, Avery is still printing this stamp.

## New Number, Old Hat (CPV)

A constant plate variety on the Hat coil that was found and reported in Coil Line back in February of 1999 has reappeared on a differently numbered strip. A black dot just to the left of the hat brim at 1R was found on strips from #1131. Now it has been found by John Himes on strips from plate #1111. This is not altogether surprising since both cylinder combinations used the same black 1 cylinder. See the illustration below.



## Trading Groups Are Good

There are two trading groups that have formed within PNC3 that I know of. Some members have taken the initiative and helped themselves as well as others who share their specialty interests. 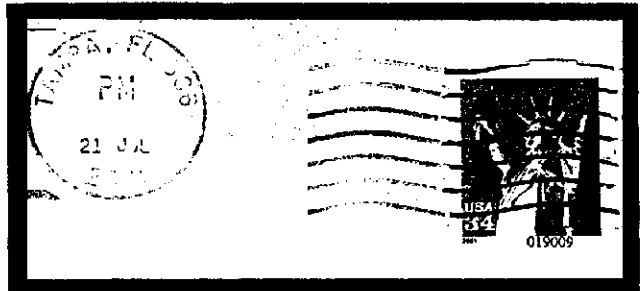
## Philatelic Counter Closures

To say it's disturbing is to understate the case. Philatelic counters are being shut down all across the country and the lack of logic behind this is maddening. It's supposed to be a belt tightening measure by USPS and everywhere it happens the claim is that it's a local decision. In my opinion, it's an uninformed decision. Within the past two months San Jose, CA, one in the Sacramento, CA, area and Manchester, NH have closed. There are others. Where're the savings? Manchester used to be open 10 hours a week spread over three days. When not serving a stamp collector that counter took regular postal customers. There was no lost time. We all know the former philatelic clerk is not going to be fired, so the

only extra time spent keeping a philatelic account open is the periodic inventory required. We are told to get our stamps from Kansas City. Well, you can't always get what you want there, and often have to accept greater quantities than desired. Quality is often marginal and pre-packaging is for their convenience not that of the collector. USPS still wants our collecting money but has turned its back on us.

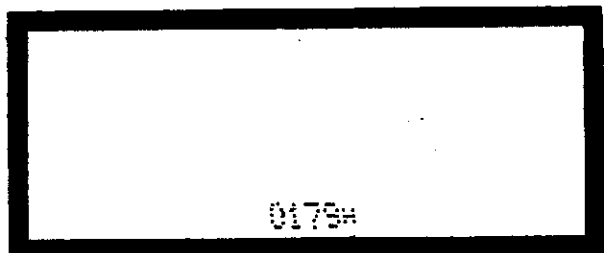
## Mystery Number Returns!

It's not the same and it's right there on the bottom of a first class letter stamp. The original stray number was determined to be a mailer's postmark permit number but that won't explain this very clear six digit number that Carl Wicklund found on a cover that was postmarked in Tampa, Florida, in July, 2001. This slightly off-center number has nothing to do with a plate number. The leading zero, which is an impossibility for a plate number, and the six digits versus the four cylinder digits found on the Statue of Liberty coil make this something else. Carl says Tampa is well known for experimenting with new things. All you detectives get busy again and find us an answer.



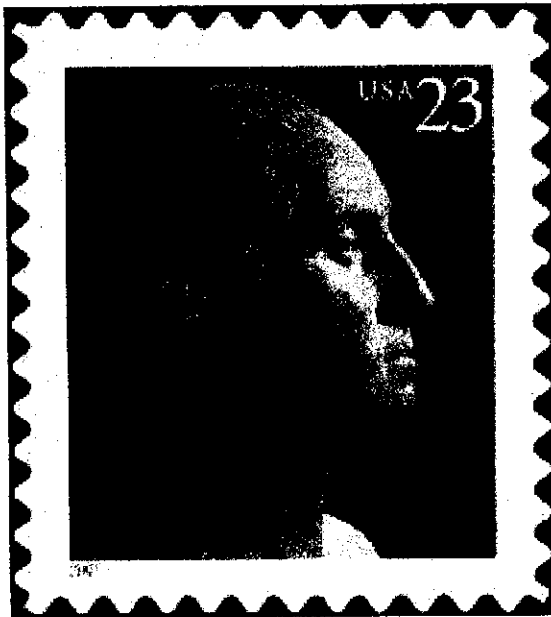
## More Funny Numbers

Here is another number puzzle, a back number this time, that Gene Trinks found on a roll of the new non-denominated Woody coil. He assured me it's a real back number because it was in proper numeric sequence if we interpret the last figure as a misshapen zero, rather than the "H" it appears to be. Look closely at the very bottom of the white area below the "H" and you will see two dots. Gene suggested those two dots and the cross bar of the "H" are the top and bottom of the zero that have shifted out of position. I'm not so sure. A dot matrix printer is not able to shift that way. I'm more inclined to believe the two dots on the lower edge are actually the top of the zero in the row below (a top back number row) and that the matrix printing of the "H" is a total misfire. It is narrower than a zero and many dots are missing from what would be a normal cipher. See for yourself in the photo below.

**George Washington Definitive Stamp**

The Postal Service will issue a 23-cent *George Washington* definitive stamp in self-adhesive coils of 100 (Item Number 772000) and panes of 20 (Item Number 102300); the panes may be split, and the stamps may be sold individually. The first day of issue is September 20, 2001, in Washington, DC. The stamp, designed and illustrated by Richard Sheaff of Scottsdale, Arizona, goes on sale nationwide September 21, 2001. The stamp has the same design and format as the *George Washington* definitive stamp issued on February 22, 2001, but has a change in background color and denomination.

**How to Order the First Day of Issue Postmark**

Customers have 30 days to obtain the first day of issue postmark by mail. They may purchase new stamps at their local Post Office, by telephone at 1 800 STAMP-24, and at the Postal Store Web site at [www.usps.com](http://www.usps.com). They should affix the stamps to envelopes of their choice, address the envelopes (to themselves or others), and place them in a larger envelope addressed to:
