## Centering lousy on all #3632?

By David Reedy

Like Dan Kauffman, I had noticed the lousy centering on Scott #3632 (June '06). My impression was that they were all bad, not just the 9's. So I did a little study. Using a low power microscope with a measuring graticule, I measured the centering on all 388 examples I had. I found with the exception of the 2's that they were almost all uniformly bad.

I measured from the edge of the design to the outer end of the peak so I would avoid negative figures if the valleys cut the design. I measured both sides and then calculated the percent of total margin that was on the left side. Due to the magnification and scale of the graticule by chance the odd percentages occur more frequently than even so when I graphed the results I grouped them by 2's.

I buy lots of 50,000 off paper definitives from a dealer who advertises they are unpicked. But how many hands

## Last call Annual Meeting issues

Within the next couple of weeks, we will be having our Annual Membership Meeting at the APS StampShow in Portland, Oregon. The meeting is on Saturday, August 11th at 1 p.m. Check the show program for location. Anyone with items to be considered at the meeting should send such requests to the President. There is normally time after the meeting for "Show n' Tell, plus Buying, Selling and Trading.

There will be a board meeting at 9 a.m. in the same room. All members are invited to sit in and observe. We will be open to comments and suggestions.

We will also have a society booth operating on all four days of the show, probably with Frank Covey's power point presentation running. Any help in staffing the booth would be appreciated. Check in at the booth and offer your assistance.

The American Philatelic Society (APS) and the Plate Number Coil Collectors Club (PNC<sup>3</sup>) will be co-sponsoring the dedication and unveiling of the 41¢ Beautiful Blooms definitive postage stamps, featuring ten different designs. The First Day ceremony will be held in rooms B113-B115 at 11 a.m. on Friday, August 10th during StampShow at the convention center. There will be two formats, a coil of 100 and a convertible booklet of 20.

Present plans, which are subject to change up until the ceremony, call for several speakers, including myself, Portland Postmaster Shaween L. Betha, a senior representative of the American Philatelic Society along with Executive Director Peter Mastrangelo, and possibly a speaker from the office of the Portland Mayor.

We probably will need lots of help affixing stamps to the program, and people to help with other tasks related to the ceremony.

Ceremony programs, which will probably have an example of a coil stamp and a booklet stamp, will be distributed to everyone in attendance at the ceremony, and we will more than likely have an autograph table.

Both PNC3 and the APS will have extra programs for sale

Sennett's SA Lion S55555 was printed with a *different size cylinder than previous plate numbers*. Consequently the plate number interval changed from 21 to 20. S55555 & higher have the 20 interval.

Ashton Potter's SA Seacoast P2222 was die cut with two different mats. One is serpentine cut on all four sides while the other has serpentine cuts on the sides and straight cuts on top and bottom

In printing the SA Seacoast with cylinders P2222 through P7777 AP changed the cylinder size from that used to print P1111. Thus the plate number intervals changed from 22 to 27. P3333 through P7777 have a small date and color order of BCMY.

Note: Although off sale the 37c Egret remains listed because of the "never found mint" numbers.

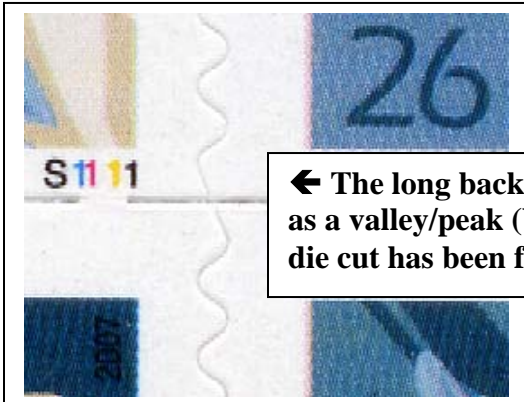
26¢ Florida Panther

The Sennett Security Products (SSP) 26¢ Florida Panther pays the postcard rate effective May 14, 2007. It was released nationwide on May 12, 2007 in self-adhesive (SA) rolls of 100.

Each roll is part of a stamp stick that is up to 10 rolls high. The stick is held together by bridges that are tiny pieces of uncut paper, which hold a coil to the coil above or below it. Sticks may be kept intact and unrolled to create coil blocks showing the bridges that connect the rolls. Shown in the left hand column is an enlargement of a coil block with the connecting bridge beneath the plate number.

The S1111 plate number in the lower right corner appears every 31 stamps along the roll. The “S” and final “1” are printed in black. Between the two black characters from left to right are blue, red, and yellow “1s”.

The year 2007 appears vertically in the upper right hand corner. Beneath it and just above the panthers shoulder on the right hand edge, the letters “USPS” are micro printed vertically on every stamp. Both are difficult to see without adequate light and magnification.

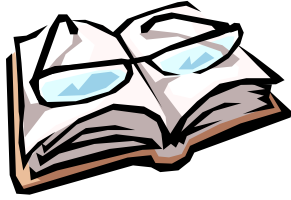


← The long backslash cut between rows identifies this as a valley/peak (VP) die cut. Currently, only the VP die cut has been found on the Florida Panther.

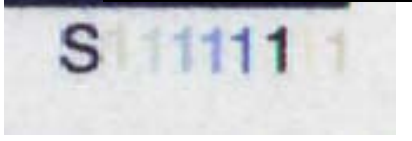

The Sennett Security Products (SSP) 17 cent Bighorn Sheep pays the first class second ounce rate effective May 14, 2007. It was released nationwide on May 21, 2007 in self-adhesive (SA) rolls of 100.

Each roll is part of a stamp stick that is up to 10 rolls high. The stick is held together by bridges that are tiny pieces of uncut paper, which hold a coil to the coil above or below it. Sticks may be kept intact and unrolled to create coil blocks showing the bridges that connect the rolls.

The S1111111 plate number in the lower right corner appears every 31 stamps along the roll. The “S” and the sixth “1” are printed in black.

In the left horn of the Bighorn Sheep, the letters “USPS” are micro-printed in blue.

The year 2007 is printed in black across the chest of the Bighorn Sheep at the bottom of the stamp.

The image at the top of the left hand column is a Valley/Peak (VP) die cut. VP is the only die cut known for this stamp so far. A VP die cut starts with a valley in the upper left corner and ends with a peak in the lower left corner. Bighorn Sheep coils are often mis-die cut giving the appearance of a PP die cut.

do they go through before ge gets them and who might pick out the best ones? So I decided to test a handful of 3632's without the PNCs from the pile. I found that the mean was almost exactly the same (63.0) as the mean of the Pncs (63.1) which strong suggests no high grading.

I also measured the 25 examples of the ND's that I had which also show a similar scarcity of 'good' centering.

I never bought any 3632's from the USPS. If they had choice centering then that might skew the abundances, especially for mint.

### Silver lining to the end of bulk mailing?

To the Editor:

The loss of our reduced mailing cost privileges for our journal mailing strikes a telling blow to our treasury and the future of our low cost membership fees. But there may be some silver linings to that dark cloud which I shall address later.

As one comes to expect, any governmental or like entity makes changes regularly and they sugar-coat the language to hide the results — until you read the fine print! Such window-dressing is usually a prelude to the “sock-it-to’em” philosophy so often employed. As the U.S. Postal Service ballyhooed reduced costs of some bulk mailings, the requirements became more stringent on achieving compliance. Here we find ourselves.

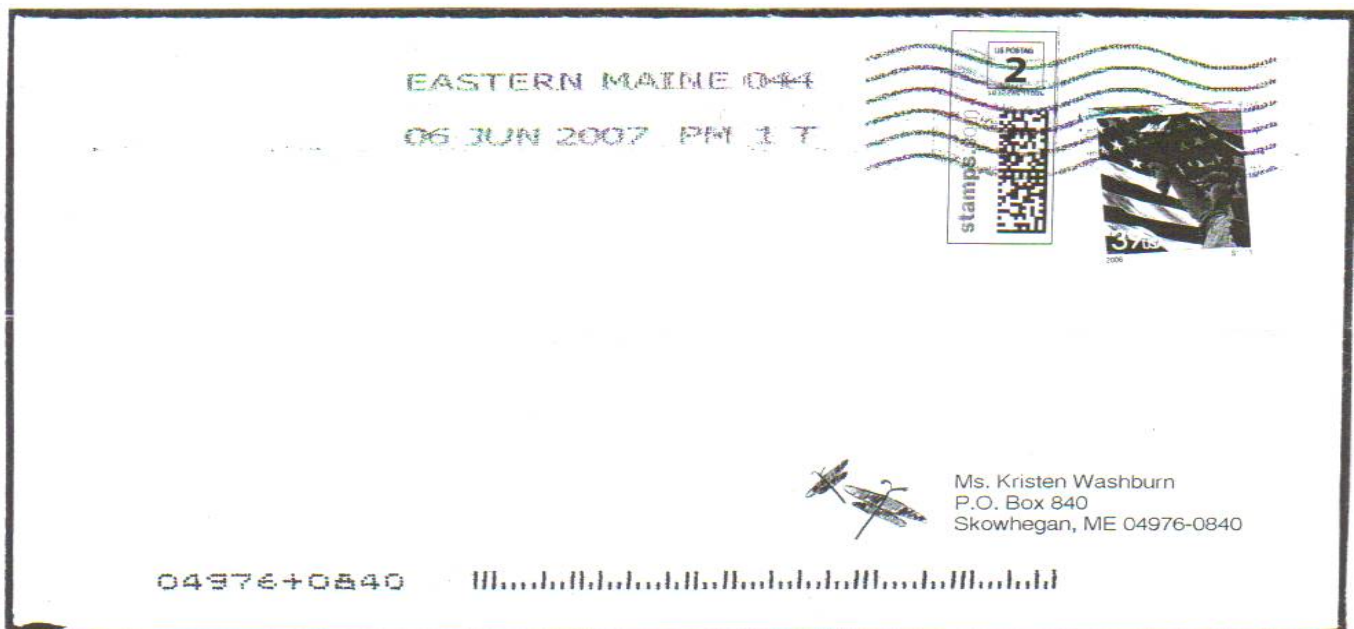
On the brighter side lies the opportunity to obtain those more difficult PNC issues that have been elusive. Finding those round cornered big roll 1st Class definitive issues used on cover has been a problem pursuit until now. We can now look to a larger supply of these PNCs coming directly into the hands of those collectors who pursue used singles. Plate numbers appear at 10-stamp intervals.

Collectors purchasing coils of 100 stamps to obtain a strip of 5 for their collection and finding themselves with an accumulation of excessive items may find a worthy donation to the club as an outlet. Should also be tax deductible.

And the obvious First Class mailing may lessen some difficulties in timely delivery as has happened in the past. Finally, this may encourage more members to take advantage of the online Coil Line and enjoy color. Other than the beleaguered Distribution Agent's increase workload, there may be some good along with the bad!

## Reporting the Rarities

I'm sending this report out a month early so that members may be wary of reports of FOP 'rarities' that aren't truly rare.

You may have noticed an article in the July 9<sup>th</sup> issue of Linn's by PNC<sup>3</sup> member and noted PNC dealer Robert Rabinowitz in which he discusses the rare die varieties of some PNCs. Once again, it is gratifying to see recognition in the mainstream philatelic press that die varieties are the modern equivalent of the rare and well-recognized perf varieties of classical US stamps.

Unfortunately, there is one error in the article that needs to be corrected. In the table of rarities he lists the Flag Over Porch self-adhesive #88888 11/12 incorrectly as 12/11. I haven't received a rash of new reports, so I suspect Coil Line readers picked up on this error. In any case, member and FOP specialist Todd R. Uebele, Sr. has sent a correction to Linn's, so I hope there aren't too many people out there who have raised false hopes.

Another point of confusion is that Rabinowitz estimates values for the six items in his table inset. I suspect that these value estimates are for plate strips of 5, but he doesn't make this clear. He doesn't discuss used singles anywhere in the article, but three of the items in the table haven't yet been found as mint strips. Maybe his article will result in some turning up. One can always hope.
