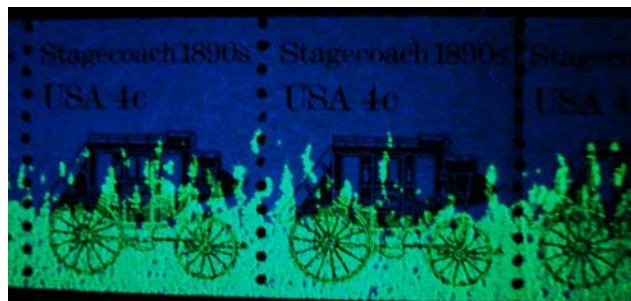

Several printers and many different formats may disturb some collectors in their pursuit of identifying individually used "Pole" stamps.

Member Jay Bigalke did a yeoman job in separating the varieties, and identifying their sources, in the June 11, 2007 issue of Linn's.

However, one of the most immediate and prominent means of recognizing printers is in the pole itself which was somehow missed.

The Sennett variety shows a dark brown pole, the Ashton Potter shows a whitish pole, and the Avery variety looks to be grey in color. These ID features apply to both the non-denominated, and the denominated issues. This seems to be the best distinguishing feature, with all the rest of the recognition features following.

Those Difficult Yellow Numbers

I'm sure many of our members are aware of the difficulty encountered trying to decipher some plate numbers on coil stamps which include those faint yellow digits. This is becoming more acute as the items age and/or are exposed to stronger light or harsh environments, which may accelerate the fading of the color.

Fugitive numbers may prove problematic in future years as collectors try to round out a series of strips to complete an issue. Of particular concern could be the Yellow Rose and other issues containing these yellow digits.

Identification of specific plates and the stamps produced from them is key to the satisfaction of acquiring the complete set. The ability to separate the similarly numbered strips easily is paramount, and failure to quickly identify the numbers is frustrating.

As color lay-down is generally constant within an issue, different numbers in a like location could

The President's Message

Thanks to Randy Fisher for his help on this. The mailing was posted on February 1st.

Last month, I mentioned that I would include an illustration of a cover that was loaned to me by new member Terry Ramsey. Terry showed me two covers, both with cancelled copies of the 37¢ Snowy Egret with plate V3211. One had a valley/peak die cut, and the other had a peak/valley die cut. These two covers are the very first reported covers with the V3211 plate combination, and are included in the rarities report elsewhere in this issue of *Coil Line*. Shown below is the peak/valley cover with a close up in the inset.

Also last month, I asked who the gentleman was in the white shirt in the photo. It is Robert Simpson, a member from Roanoke, Virginia.

Since the U. S. Postal Service confirmed their position not to change plate numbers at the media briefing in Portland, Oregon during Stamp Show, there have been some interesting developments.

The first two new plate number combinations that appeared after the confirmation announcement in August, P8888 and P9999 on the 5¢ nondenominated Sea Coast stamps, could possibly be explained away as having been printed and stored well before the "no new plate number" policy was announced.

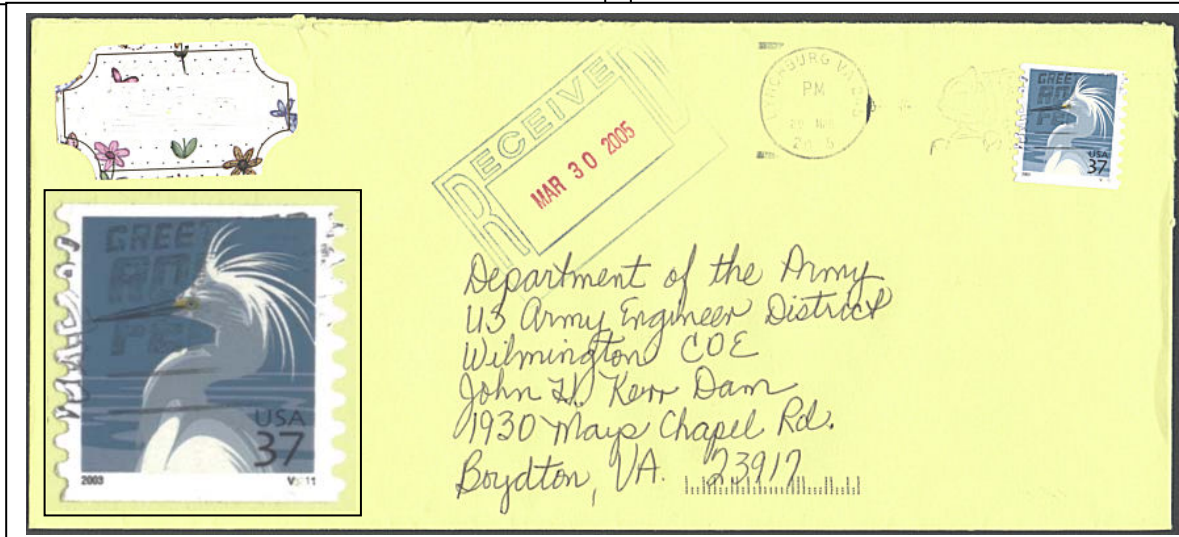
In late December, 2007, long after the change in policy, a new plate number was found on the Forever ATM pane of 18. The original plate combination, V11, was printed on the back of the pane. The new number, V22222, was printed on the tear off strip on the stamp side.

Just after the start of the new year, the 41¢ Sennett Flag stamps were found with a tagging variety. The original printing was on prephosphored paper and the tagging appeared as mottled. The new find has smooth tagging and the same plate numbers.

Right on the heels of that discovery, the 41¢ Beautiful Blooms coils showed up sporting plate combination P2222. An examination of the original number and the new number stamps revealed no apparent differences.

The first week of February brought another surprise. The 41¢ Avery Dennison Flag coil surfaced with plate V22222. In this case, there is a difference under short wave ultra-violet light. The V11111 stamps have a dead appearance, while the white strips on the V22222s glow a bright white.

Along with the items mentioned above, there was another stamp that has apparently been reprinted and has a new plate number. That would be the 41¢ Silver Hearts convertible booklet of 20, which was issued in June, 2007. The new plate combination is P22222. As of press time, I have not seen any of the stamps with the new plate number, but have had reports that the "USA 41" is darker than on the original.

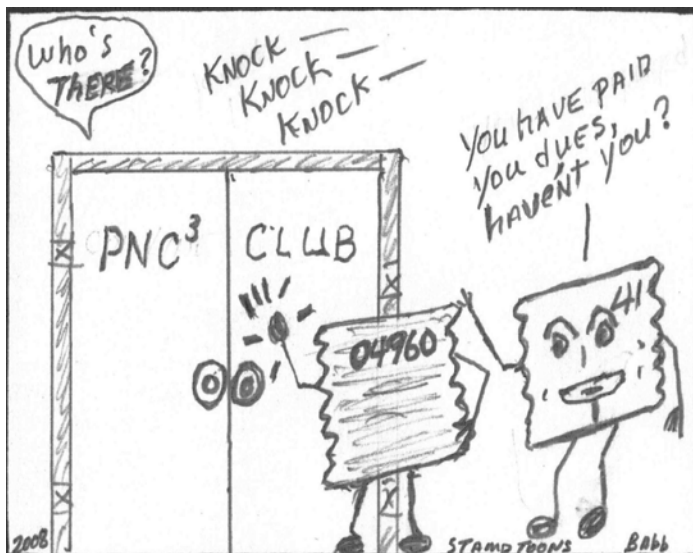
When the Postal Service announced the 'no new plate number' policy, the criteria was that there would be no plate number changes "unless a major change in production such as using a new press, a recreation of the computer file used to make the plates, or a significant materials change occurs. In those cases a new series of plate number 2 will be used."

So, what is happening? Why have we recently seen so many new plate numbers? What are the printers trying to tell us? Is it possible that one of the changes is that the release liner has been eliminated from the stamp paper? Is it possible that the U.S. Postal Service is trying to get extra money from collectors by issuing stamps with new plate numbers, and fudging on their stated policy?

FROM THE EDITOR...

New Publishing Schedule

Coil Line has been greatly improved over the last few months. This is the result of implementing new procedures, and through the cooperation of the staff and membership, who have given of themselves to make *Coil Line* what it is, and what it will become with each succeeding issue.

One of the persistent difficulties is to get it out on time. This is due to several combined factors which cause delays with some members getting their journal days, or in rare cases weeks beyond the first of the month. Even when deadlines are met, problems with the USPS are also a factor. With the editor and staff working diligently, making innovations monthly, it seems not enough is being done to improve delivery time.

Three key members of the PNC³ club have been discussing this at length during the past week, and believe we have come up with a sensible solution that will improve the situation greatly.

Starting with the May issue of *Coil Line*, we have set in motion key dates for the process to work. As of that issue, the deadline for all material to be published, must be in the hands of the editor on or before the 1st of the month prior to the issue month, that is to say that all material for the May issue must be received by the 1st of April, and so on.

The second key date will be the 25th of the month, which is the absolute latest date for the issue to be mailed. This date will be met at all costs. This allows a full week for the journal to arrive in members mail boxes no later than the 2nd or 3rd of the month. For members that still have difficulty in getting their issue on time, we have reduced the First Class fee to only \$3.00. This is done in the spirit of having everyone working together for the efficient delivery of our journal in a timely and prompt manner.

41¢ Flag Constant Plate Variety

I have found a constant plate variety on this coil. It appears on stamp 6 right of the plate number. As I have another strip with the same red dot in

the same position, I can assume it is constant.

These scans clearly show a red spot 1/16 inch above and slightly to the right of the "A" of "USA".

New Constant Plate Variety

By Michael Mules



I have discovered a double constant plate variety on this coil. They appear on stamps 1 and 2 just to the right of the PNC stamp. Pictured is a cropped PS5 of the non-denominated 41¢ Flag regular issue, above top. The two stamps are cropped and enlarged for easy viewing.

A plain white dot appears just above and to the right of the "A" in the USA, under the furl of the flag, on stamp number one, above left. On stamp #2, notice the more pronounced "Donut" shaped spot, just above the "t" in "First", above right. For this reason, I am calling this the "Donut" CPV.

become a problem if it is difficult to identify that digit exactly. Lacking such ability to prove a number then becomes a monumental problem unless adjoining numbers eliminate the possibility of mis-identification.

As an example, consider plate numbers 2233 and 2333 of the Yellow Rose issue. As the second digit of the plate number is the yellow one, the absence of the second digit would leave the remaining numbers 2_33 on both. The same is possible on numbers 3344 vs. 3444 as well as 5455 vs. 5555, 5566 vs. 5666 and 6677 vs. 6777.

Whether due to fading or under-inking, some of these yellow digits are very light, and nearly impossible to see clearly in normal light.

A further concern is the Flag Over City issue. Although those numbers still remain identifiable, excepting the first, or yellow, digit, the ink shows definite deterioration, or lightening. PNCers may not be concerned unless they also collect PNBs. Then a like situation as suggested previously may occur with those numbers.

The quality of the pigmentation in those two issues is the result of using two different colors. The Yellow Rose was printed with (yellow) PMS 156C, and the FOC used (yellow) PMS 106C. The Yellow Rose color hints at having a bit more magenta included. Perhaps this accounts for the apparent greater persistency.

It would be a shame if the yellow digits were to disappear from plate numbers due to fading or other reasons.

There is help for this situation, however. In early 1986, Thom Wheeler found that a blue filter assisted in viewing the yellow digits. He taped a piece of blue film, obtained from a set of 3-D glasses, to a magnifying glass. He could then see the yellow digits easily as well as enlarged.

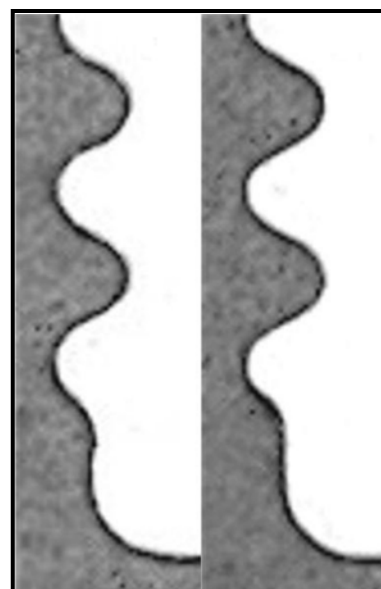
Atlas Die Cut Varieties

Atlas Die Cut Variety Breakdown by Plate Number

Warning - if you don't like minor varieties, you will want to skip this article.

Ron Blanks first wrote about the existence of two subtly different die cut varieties on Avery's Atlas coil in the October issue of The United States Specialist. On one version, the transition from the last peak at the lower left to the straight vertical section below it is broader and more curved, while on the other it is a more sharp transition (also there are subtle differences in the peaks and valleys). The first one he calls a rounded shoulder type (left side of image) and the second one he calls an angled shoulder type (right side of image). They are analogous to the round and square shoulder types of some earlier BEP large roll coils, but think of these new ones as more rounded and less rounded and the difference between these two new varieties is more subtle (I can only see them under magnification).



Based on used stamp data from Ron Blanks, Bob Murrin, and myself, there are four plate number combinations that are known to come both ways. Of those, the V11222 and V12222 seem to have roughly equal quantities of both types, while the V21111 seems to come mainly with the angled type and the V33333 seems to come mainly with the rounded type. Please note that this is for used stamps and may not reflect which version is more common in the mint strips that are on the market for these four plate numbers.

Relative Frequency Survey

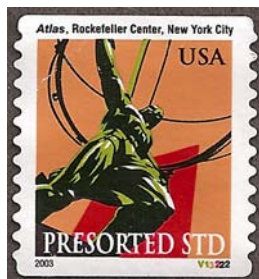
Jeff Fiszbein, an avid mixture sorter, has supplied data on his findings of the peak and valley combinations for recent PNC issues that have many numbers and also have both peak/valley and valley/peak die varieties. He has forwarded this data to Coil Line to share with members, so that members may have a means to judge the relative rarity of the various plate numbers and die cut configurations.

Data like this is important to the hobby. There is no longer any data released by printers that indicates how many stamps with a given plate number were produced. The same applies to the die cut varieties. Thus the only way that collectors can judge relative scarcity of a particular plate number or die cut variety is to learn the relative frequency they occur in mixtures.

It is not sufficient to base any judgment of scarcity on dealer prices for mint PS/5s. In many cases, diligent dealer searches have revealed sufficient quantities of rare numbers or varieties to satisfy collector demand, and the prices assigned to PS/5s do not truly reflect that a small quantity actually was released for sale.

Members are invited to submit data on their own holdings of these stamps. Additional input is needed because the quantities listed in the table at the right are from only one collector. More searchers in different parts of the country may well have found larger or smaller quantities of a given number or die variety and therefore aid in completing a more accurate picture of the true relative scarcity of a particular item. As a direct result of my November 5th article in Linn's on PNC rarities, there have been a number of reports by non-members. Consequently, the totals for many of the listed rarities have increased this month.

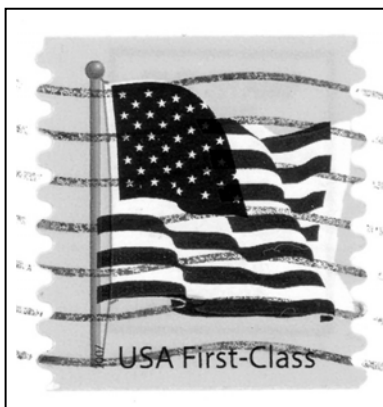

Linn's reports that the Seacoast design is finally going to be replaced either some time late this year or early next year.

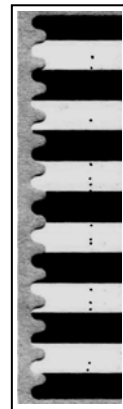
When listing Seacoast splices in the January issue, I forgot to mention the P5555 strip that was shown in the July 2007 issue (page 89).

Banner Seam Lines?

Mike Lipson has found some strips of Sennett's (10¢) Banner that show a broken vertical line of blue dots on the left side of the 2R stamp (5th stamp in a PS5). They are about halfway into the red and white stripes, which seems like an odd place for a seam line, but since the blue in the design doesn't start until further in, it is not an impossible place. In order to make them show in the image here, they have been computer enhanced (there are dots hidden in the red stripes too).

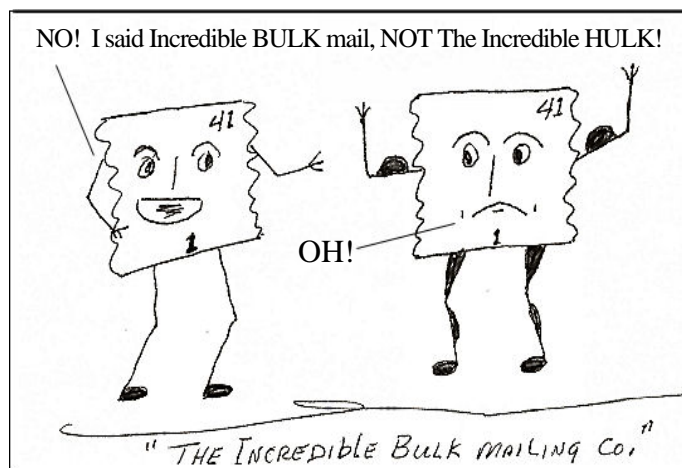

Sennett's SA Lion S55555 was printed with a different size cylinder than previous plate numbers. Consequently the plate number interval changed from 21 to 20. S55555 & higher have the 20 interval.

Ashton Potter's SA Seacoast P2222 was die cut with two different mats. One is serpentine cut on all four sides while the other has serpentine cuts on the sides and straight cuts on top and bottom.

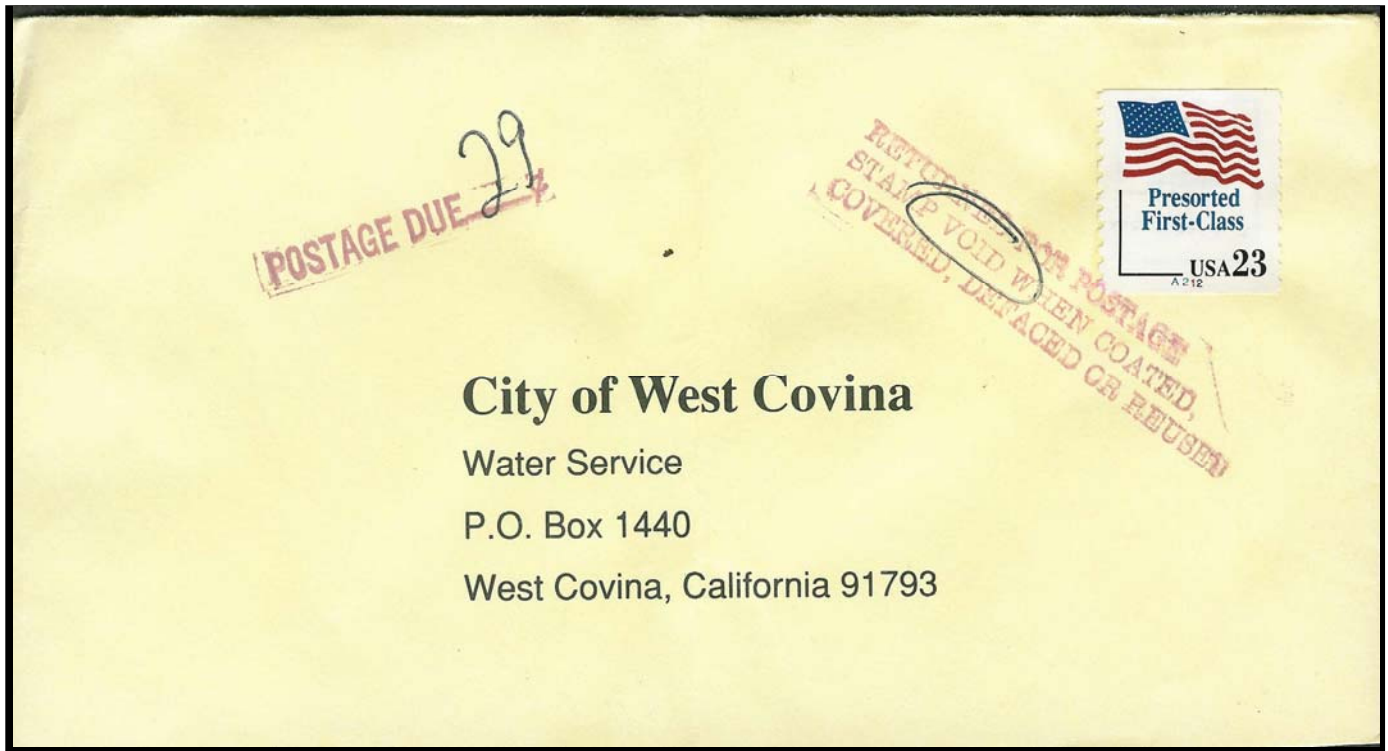
In printing the SA Seacoast with cylinders P2222 through P9999 AP changed the cylinder size from that used to print P1111. Thus the plate number intervals changed from 22 to 27. P3333 through P9999 have a small date and color order of BCMY.

Dear Members,

Hello to all you old time members who have been dealing with me as the auction director for PNC³ for the last 18 years or 35 auctions, and to all newcomers who may not know me or how the auction works. I would like to bring everyone up to date on how the auction works and some of the terms and other information to help you bid in the club auctions.

First off let me let you know that I try to be as fair as possible in reviewing and grading all lots sent in for the auctions. And to almost everyone who has placed a bid and won, or to those whose lots I have changed, there have been few a members who have disagreed with my eyes. I would like to start with the way I grade the strips that are sent in for the auctions. I start with the centering of the design on the stamp in relation to the edges of the stamp.

F = the stamp is well off center and the perfs are into the design.

F-VF = the centering is better but still off center and I try to list high or to Left, etc.

VF = the design is still better but not perfect.

XF = almost perfect but just the slightest bit off.

S = The design has equal margins all around with regard to the edges of the stamp.

On the older strips where there is a seam line I grade those as follows:

F = line does not touch the perfs at all

F-VF = Line will touch or be slightly into the perfs.

VF = the line will be 50% into the perfs.

XF = the line could be 100% into the perfs but not 100% centered.

S = the line is 100% centered on the perfs.

I then list any problems with the gum or any other faults that may be found on the stamps, or strips, like finger prints on the gum, short or pulled perfs, or even bent perfs. It should be understood that all strips are MNH unless I list otherwise.

The auction starts when I call for lots in the Coil Line, and ends when I send the treasurer the proceeds after all expenses have been deducted and paid. But there is a lot that goes on in between those two events. As the lots arrive in my PO Box I start to review them by taking all lots out of the glassines or whatever you put them in and TAPE them to the submittal sheets. Please try not to tape them closed because it takes extra time that I may not have to unseal and remove the stamps. I check all lots to make sure of grading and faults and have found many that are not listed on your sheets. I am sure that you would not keep a stamp that has faults if I don't list them and I can assure you that all members feel the same and have returned lots to me for just that reason. That is why I check all lots, but there is always the one that I may have missed.

Once I am finished with a consignor's lots I punch holes in the sheets and put them in three ring binders arranging them in Scott's catalog order so that when all lots are in I can number them and start typing up the auction. The faster that the lots arrive the quicker I can do all the above. When you wait until the last day to mail them, it puts me behind as I have a cut off date to type up the auction and send it on to the Editor to put in Coil Line. Try to plan ahead for the auctions as the submittal form is not dated, and you can make as many copies as you need and use them for any auction. I do still only allow 25 lots per member in any one auction. But say over the winter months you can mount up 100 lots but not price them until you pull them to mail to me. That way you don't need to rush to put lots together for an auction. And we have been holding auctions twice a year, in October and March since I have been running them. Maybe once I retire and have more time we could have them more often, but that is not for a few more years. I am still a young man and have more years to work than I care to think about.

As the bids start to come in for the auction by mail and email my wife kicks in and starts to help with entering the bids and checking to make sure that minimum bids are met. We still have in every auction a member or two that just does not pay any attention to this and places low ball bids on lots. This is a waste of my time and yours, so please watch out for this. Once all the bids are in, we double check to make sure that the winning bidder is just one advance over the second highest bidder and that all bid sheets have been reviewed and no bids have been missed.

I then write up the invoices to members who do not use the internet and mail those out. I write up the invoices for those on the net, and then email them the total that is owed, so they can mail in their checks. These members will receive the invoice in the mailing with the lots they won so they have a record. I mail out the lots to the winning bidders once I have received your payment in the mail. I do not hold the lots waiting for the checks to clear as that would take way too long and many bidders email me looking for the lots less than a week after they mail their checks in. Please remember that we are dealing with the Chicago Post Office which has a bad record for delivering the mail on a timely basis.

Once all lots have been mailed I start to put together the unsold lots and the payment to the consignors and mail those out along with their invoice detailing all lots that sold and did not sell. As soon as this

has been done I wait for all checks to clear the bank and total up any expenses like postage or supplies that I may have needed to buy and deduct those from the total that the club keeps and mail a check to the treasurer to close out the auction and start the next one. The club keeps 10% of the winning bid on each lot with a minimum of 50c and on the unsold lots there is a 50c fee that is charged and taken out of the proceed to that seller before I mail them their checks, so there is no need to ever mail me a check when submitting lots unless you think you are not going to sell anything.

One thing I did forget to mention is that as I am going over the lots sent in for the auctions if I see lots that will not sell because of some fault or it is not the stamp you may think it is I will hold that out and there is no charge for that lot. Also if I think the starting bids are too high I will contact you to let you know and give you a chance to lower the min. before the auction is typed up. These hold outs will be returned at the close of the auction in my mailing to the consignors. On the newest consignment sheets there is a box to check if you would like me to hold any unsold lot for the next auction which I have done for several consignors to cut down on the cost of postage which is deducted from all proceeds that I pay out to the consignors.

I know this is pretty lengthy and I may have missed something, but I hope I have informed the membership of the working of the club auction and helped to clear up any questions that may have been out there. If you still need more information that I may not have covered here please contact me via email or phone or even snail mail. I am also open to any suggestions that may come of this writing to improve on the auction.

I do make available to members on the net a scan of any lots that they may have interest in bidding on. These scans are free and if you want one mailed to you there would be a charge to cover postage and the print of the lot on paper. That fee would be 10¢ per lot plus postage.
