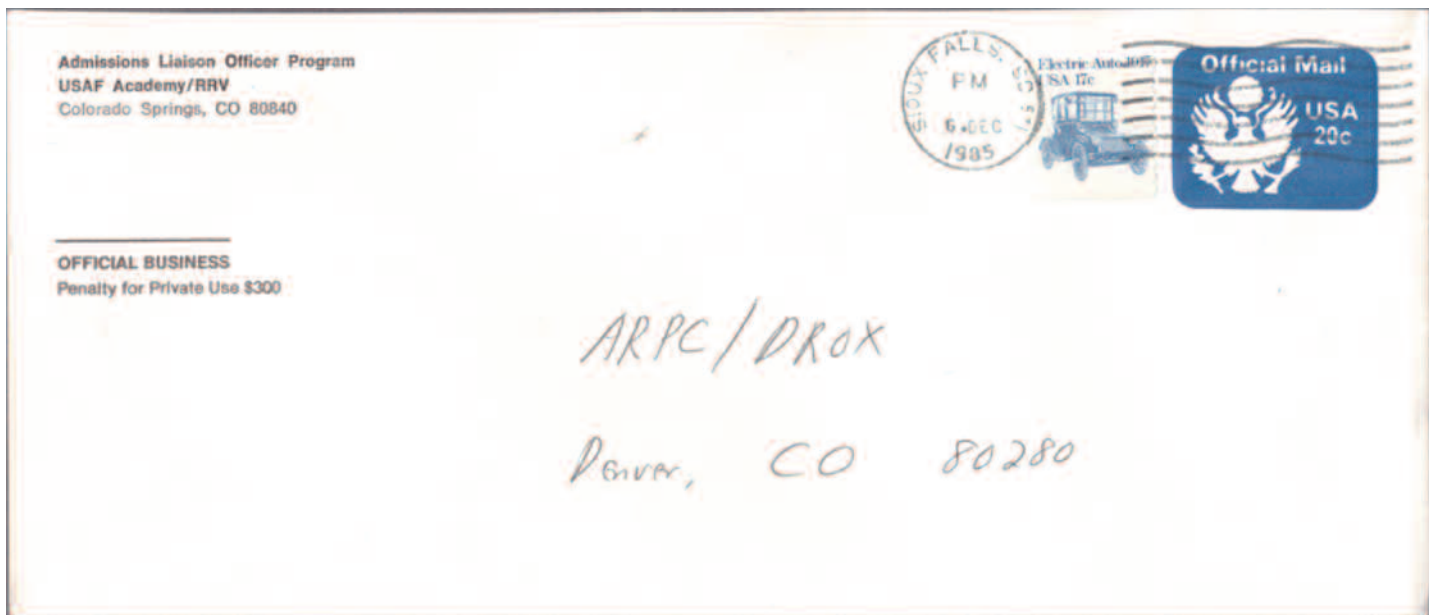

Happy New Year! Here is the latest commercial covers news and new finds:

A 22¢ Flag #4 Erie Blue cover was sold in July 2016 for \$1,500! This is a new record for that pnc variety on cover. One of the only five known 18¢ Flag #7 covers sold in early 2016 for \$3,250.

I came across a couple interesting 17¢ Electric Auto coil usages. The first cover is one of only a very few 17¢ Electric Auto coil usages from the short 18¢ first class rate period (3/22/81-10/31/81). The 17¢ Electric Auto coil was issued to pay for additional ounces after the first ounce and it so served that purpose for both the 18¢ and 20¢ first class letter rates.





The second cover is the first 17¢ Electric Auto coil usage I have ever seen used on a 20¢ official postal envelope.

Last is the new earliest known usage of the 41¢ Beautiful Blooms #P2222, 3/15/08. While plate #P1111 is fairly easy to find, usages of plate #P2222 are much tougher

to find.

Please continue to let me know about your new interesting finds and new earliest usages reports. My next installment will cover philately's greatest pnc cover hoard finds of all-time.

From 30 Years Ago . . .

7.1¢ Tractor mint plate strip of 5, plate # 1
(Scott # 2127)



This is the phosphor-tagged "collector" edition of the 7.1¢ Tractor shown on the masthead page, issued together 30 years ago this month (February 6, 1987). (The masthead shows the workhorse version, precanceled "Nonprofit Org." in black ink.)

Plate number 1 was used in both versions because each came from differently designed print sleeves for the "B" press. That press was able to apply up to three inks from a single engraved sleeve. The sleeve for the above plain coil was engraved as shown, to apply only red ink. But the precanceled version's sleeve had added engraving to apply black ink as well.

Interestingly, a third version of the 7.1¢ Tractor was issued in 1989, bearing plate number 1, with a replacement service inscription, "Nonprofit 5-Digit ZIP+4."

New Patriotic Nonprofit Coil Planned

Here's something new: our most recent (5¢) non-

profit-rate coil, 2016's "USA Star," is being replaced in a relatively short timeframe by a new coil that is based on the same design. From a Dec. 28 USPS press release:

"Patriotic Nonprofit, the new non-denominated, nonprofit-price stamp, showcases the letters 'USA' in blue, accompanied by a bright red star on a white background with a blue border. To create the new design, the 2016 USA stamp art was rendered slightly smaller to accommodate the blue border. Intended for bulk mailings by authorized nonprofit organizations, this stamp will be issued in coils of 10,000. Art director Antonio Alcalá designed the 2017 Patriotic Nonprofit stamp using the 2016 USA stamp art he designed with Leslie Badani."

No release date was given.

Two PNC Finds in Forgotten Cache

If two scarce PNC varieties (one listed in "Reporting the Rarities," last published in the Jan. 2016 **Coil Line**) could stay unnoticed right under my nose for more than 10 years, what scarce PNCs might be reposing unawares in your hobby accumulations?

It is a so-called tagged stamp because it was not purposely or erroneously phosphor-tagged with the normal amount of phosphors designed to trigger equipment to cancel stamped mail. Instead, it has a weaker amount of phosphor compound in the paper due to contamination.

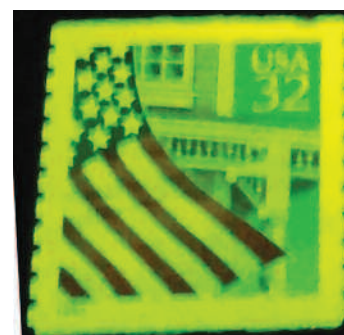

An early-November peek into a long-set-aside box revealed PNC clippings sorted by design. Found among the self-adhesive (25¢) Diner PNCs (Scott 3208A) was a #22211 with the "rounded transition" die-cut shape from corner to first peak or valley (Figure 1, left stamp). The rarities chart lists it as the round-shoulder die type (PNC-ID 1998-7.21) with these reported finds: mint singles = none, mint strip / 5 = none, used singles = 104, on-cover = 9.

Figure 2 illustrates two copies of the (5¢) Mountain on the weakly phosphored paper, with a 32¢ Flag over Porch (Scott 2913) on normal phosphored paper. My #11111 find is on the lower right, while the (5¢) Mountain on the lower left is a plain one I previously found. This image was taken under shortwave ultraviolet light (SW-UV) and shows the 32¢'s strong glow next to the weak Mountains' glow.

In viewing the whole rarities chart, the 104 stands out as the highest quantity. Two other PNCs as second less-scarce used singles show counts in the low 70s, next two near 50, two near 3, and the others rarer. So it is not surprising that my PNC, while in the chart, is the most-reported. The type is not noted in the Scott catalog, but 2014's PNC³ Values list has its market price near \$44.

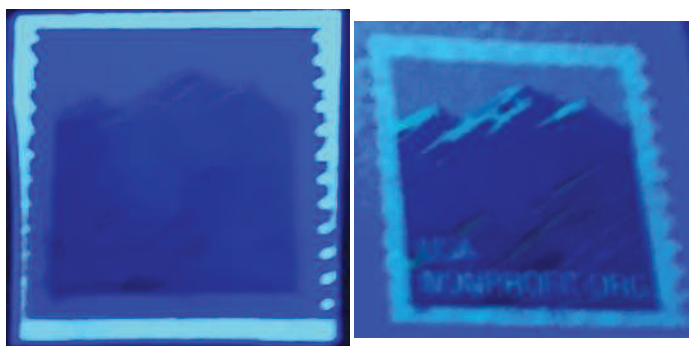

The other PNC variety I found (Figure 1, right stamp) is listed by Scott, but is not in the rarities column. It is the so-called "tagged" version (Scott 2903a) of the ordinary perforated (5¢) Mountain, #11111 (Scott 2903, lettering outlined in heavier purple ink, tiny "1996"). This is not to be confused with coils from large-date rolls of #S111, Scott 2904, letters not outlined. The PNC³ Values guide prices it (1996-5.12) at \$39 (same as a mint strip of 5, but on cover as \$500).

Figure 3 shows only a plain-paper example next to the weakly tagged #11111 under SW-UV. Interestingly, effects of the SW-UV on any optical brighteners in the envelope paper highlight the coils' traits here. The plain coil's envelope paper is pretty bright, while the coil itself appears "dead." In contrast, the weakly tagged coil's glow is evident, even as the envelope paper appears dark.

Why is the 25¢ Diner with the round-transition die listed in the rarities chart, but not the weakly tagged 5¢ Mountain? I didn't have a chance at the time of this writing to ask Gene Trinks, author of the chart. He might address this in a future rarities column. I suspect the understandable bias for mint examples undergirds the chart's choices. Most PNC collectors favor mint condition.

The chart lists 21 PNC and, incredibly, only five are reported in any mint form; all those counts given are in single digits. In spite of the highest used count in the chart, this 25¢ Diner variety has yet to be found as mint. On the other hand, the 5¢ Mountain variety is more of a contamination oddity than a true error. Far fewer collectors are interested in traits that require SW-UV to observe and mint strips have dropped in price in recent years. As an example, Scott's 2010 estimate was \$60 for a strip of five, yet \$65 for a used single.

Precancels Not to Be Collected Mint?

The United States Postal Service apparently does not want coil collectors to collect precancel stamps. The latest two issues of *USA Philatelic* do not list precancel stamps for sale.

There are three kinds of precancel stamps: Non-profit, Presorted Standard and Presorted First Class. None of these are denominated and all are used by mass mailers. The Nonprofit stamps are valued at 5 cents each. The Presorted Standard stamps are valued at 10 cents each and the Presorted First Class stamps are valued at 25 cents each. These values have not changed since their inception even though there have been different designs over the years.

The current designs for each of the precancels are pictured.

I called the Philatelic Fulfillment in late December



and found out these are still on sale even though they are not listed. They are available in strips of 25 or full 10K rolls. The item numbers for each are:

USA Nonprofit

777503 Strip of 25

777504 10K coil

Stars and Stripes Presorted Standard

783203 Strip of 25

783204 10K coil

Star Quilts

799903 Strip of 25

799905 10K coil

My contact would not tell me the exact quantities available even though those taking orders have that information. The contact did say that there were less than 2,000 strips available in each of the "Strips of 25" listings.

Collectors can use these stamps on their mail if they have a permit to use them. The permit is free to collectors. Visit the PNC³ website to learn how to obtain a permit.

BCA Flag Stamp in 10-Roll Stick

I don't know if this is new news or old news, but it's new to me.

I find there are two (2) different kinds of the current flag stamp produced by BCA in 10-roll stick form. As the scan shows, there are two different roll labels, that's clear. What's not so clear are the way the rolls are held together.

The top roll shows the common tabs as used with the SSP. The bottom strip uses what appears to me to resemble a saw-tooth pattern. Under 30x magnification, the tips appear at 1/32 of an inch apart. Both styles are die cut 13/12 P/V.

Theft of Newport Harbor Stamp Company Stock

USPS Offers Two New Coil Issues

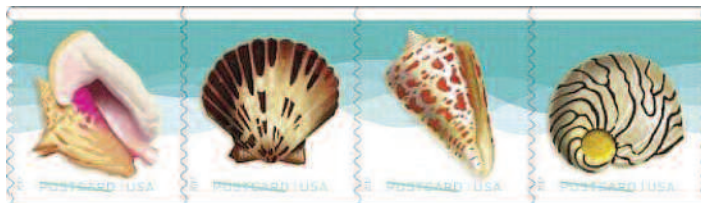
The December 22, 2016, *Postal Bulletin* published details of the new <49¢> Flag issue with release date of January 27. In addition to booklets of 10 and 20 and an ATM sheetlet of 18, coil rolls of 100 will be available. The 49¢ price



reflects the new first-class (one-ounce) letter rate effective January 22. Technical data are included for all but the ATM sheetlet to be published later. All items are self-stick stamps.

The two commercial stamp suppliers currently under USPS contract have each produced the coil format, printing two billion stamps apiece (20 million rolls each). Ashton Potter's (AP) rolls have a "P1111" plate number every 31st stamp, while Banknote Corporation of America's (BCA) have "B1111" at the same interval.

Interestingly, the AP ink colors are listed as "black, cyan, magenta, yellow," versus BCA colors of "cyan, magenta, yellow, black." It remains to be seen with coils in-hand if the plate numbers reflect these sequences, respectively, and what (if any) impact the difference makes on the appearances of the design.



The second coil issue is the postcard-rate <34¢> Seashells, featuring four designs. (The postcard rate remained unchanged when the letter rate was raised by 2¢. The self-adhesives are furnished in rolls of 100 with a January 28 first day of issue, same as the only other format offered, sheetlet panes of 20. Aston Potter produced five million rolls, which have a "P111111" plate number every 32nd stamp.

Regarding the six digits in the plate number (one for each ink), the first four colors listed are the four process colors, but in the sequence given earlier for BCA's Flag, not AP's. The last two colors are "PMS7471c Turquoise, PMS Cool Gray 5c." (PMS stands for Pantone Matching System, an industry-standard color specification.)

The listed seashell names do not seem to match the USPS media image sequence, so here's a tentative sequence the descriptive names suggest: Queen (or pink) conch, Pacific calico scallop, alphabet cone, zebra nerite. Also, if you recall the USPS media image shown in the December 2016

Coil Line, it did not show tiny "2017" year dates at lower left, but a larger "2017" as part of the design text. The image here shows that has been remedied.

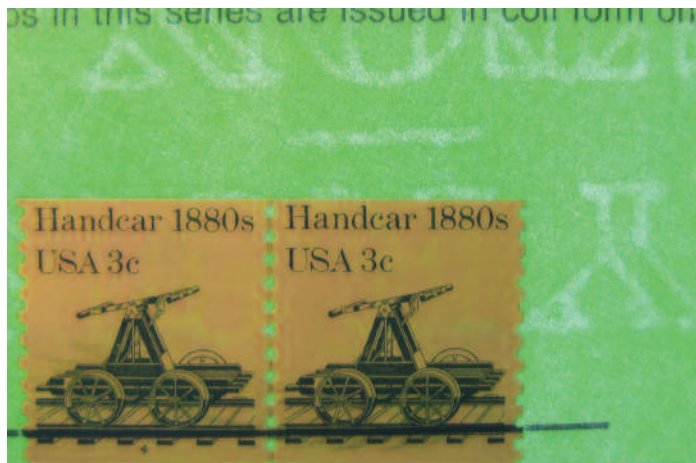
Souvenir Sheet Variety for 3¢ Handcar Coil

The 3¢ Handcar coil was released March 25, 1983. The plate numbers are 1 with 2 and 3 with 4, pairings typical for Cottrell press printings. The souvenir page is ASPPP No. 8309, Scott No. SP540.

Both PNC³ and ASPPP (American Society for Philatelic Panels and Pages) show this issue's souvenir page paper with the Parson Linen Record 100% Cotton Fiber watermark. Neither PNC³ or ASPPP mention any finding of Plate No. 1, an unusual and interesting omission in that its "partner," Plate No. 2, is on record.

The purpose of this article is to report the confirmed finding of Byron Weston Linen 100% Cotton Fiber watermarked paper with year date 1982 used for 3¢ Handcar souvenir sheets. Either BW82 or W82 (both refer to the same watermark) must now be listed as a paper variety for this souvenir sheet.



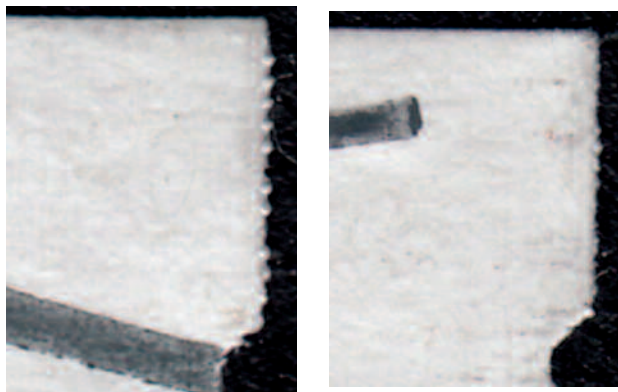
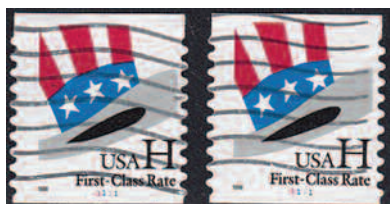
The discovery piece bears a Plate No. 4 as the left stamp of a coil pair (see illustration). Note that the watermark of the souvenir sheet is inverted. This is known as the "C" orientation. Potentially, there are eight watermark orientations, but it is highly unlikely that any others except "A," which complements "C," exist, and "A" is (obviously) unreported to date.

Collectors of souvenir sheets are requested to check their holdings of this issue.

Update on Incision Styles

In April and May 2016, I reported finds of the "B" incision styles for the 3265 (33¢) "H" Hat stamp. April was to report the "B" incision on the #2222 and May was to report the "B" incision on the #3333. Since then, I found Gene Trinks' *Coil Line* article, "Production Varieties of Self-Adhesive Coil Stamps," from June and July 2002. With this information, I continued my hunt. I have now found the #1111 with "B" incision. Two stamps are pictured.



The close ups show the upper right corner of both stamps. The left stamp has many of the paper ties in place. The right stamp is missing most of the paper ties. When two stamps are pulled apart the ties will end up on one stamp or the other, most times not evenly.

A "B" incision stamp without the paper ties (like the right stamp) is very hard to identify. I use a 10X loupe to pick them out and then verify with a 40X hand-held mini-microscope. The #1111 "B" incision style was not on Gene's 2002 known type chart.

Here are the quantities I have found with "B" incision: #1111 (49), #1131 (0), #2222 (28), #2222 (black line variety) (1), #3333 (19)

In July 2016, I reported my find of a "Dttr" incision style for the 3263 22¢ Uncle Sam stamp. I have now found seven copies with the "Dttr" incision style. They are not all the same.

Two stamps are pictured. The close ups show the upper right corner of both stamps. The left stamp has ties along all straight upper and lower parts of the die-cut. The



right stamp is clean cut along all these straight areas. This second "Dttr" type can't be a reverse of the common "Dtll" die-cut. This has to be from a second, completely different die-cut mat. I have found four copies of the left type and three copies of the right type.

This got me looking at my 2915A 32¢ Flag over Porch #66666A and #88888A "Dttr" stamps. I can't see ties in the straight areas on either of these stamps under 40X magnification. I only have one used copy of each. This raises a question about the die-cut mats. Is the "Dttr" a different mat than the "Dtll" and not a reverse of the "Dtll"? Members with mint strips should be able to answer this question.

Reporting the Rarities by Gene Trinks

Here we are in another year and there are many changes to the counts previously reported. Thanks to all of those reporting.

The most dramatic change to the counts is the addition of 13 used singles to the Egret P22222 multi-tie (12 from one dealer), bringing the total to 15. There was only one report in 2016. A close second was the report of four covers with the Eagle & Shield STD #11111 round shoulder die.

Two reports of the Egret V3211 (one VP, one PV, those nearly a year apart) bring their totals to 50 (VP) and 10 (PV). On the FOP scene, I had a report of the #66666 10/11 die (count now at 23) and another of the 78777 10/10 die (now at 73). There were also two reports of the 13231A V/P, bringing that count to 61. In the Atlas arena, another report of the V21211 tagged brings that count to seven.

The two newest additions to the list have NO increases to their counts. I would have thought that members would have immediately checked their collections and duplicates once these rarities were announced and more would have been discovered and recorded.

Since the total for the Diner 22211 round shoulder has now exceeded 100, I'm thinking it should be removed from this list. Scarce? Yes. Rare? Maybe not. Anyone with opinions to the contrary can contact me at gctrinks@cox.net or 16415 W. Desert Wren Ct., Surprise AZ 85374.

PNC Error Overlooked in Stock Sheet

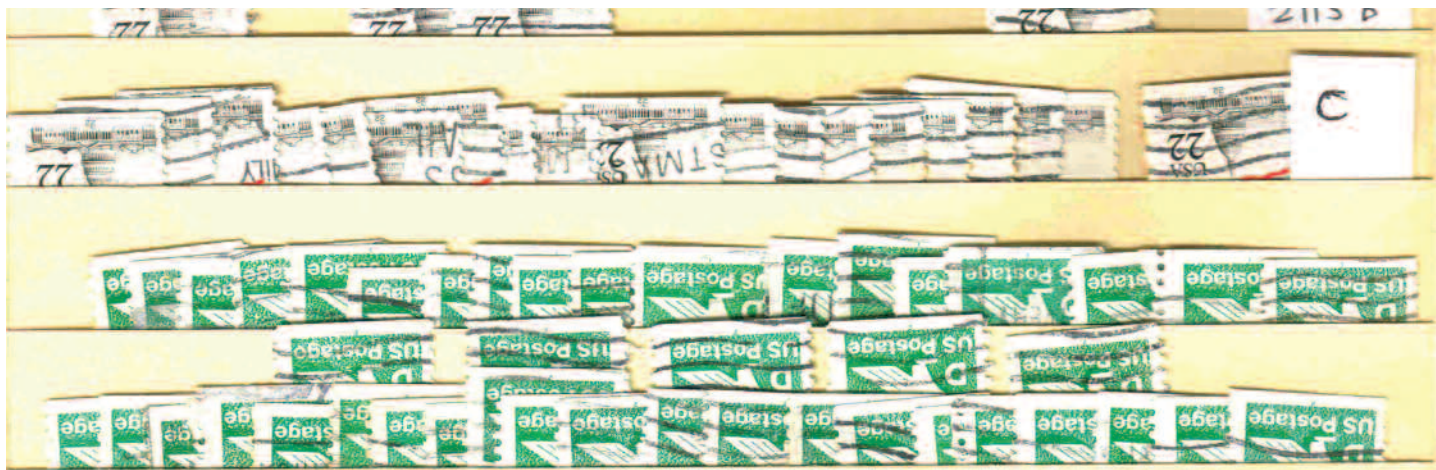

Stock sheets, such as the one in Figure 1, might not be the best way to store duplicate stamps, but many of us use them. For duplicates of common off-paper used PNCs, they offer convenient and inexpensive filing (assuming one positions them upside down as I do). But these 22¢-era PNCs of Figure 1 can hide an overlooked trait when overlapped in their sleeves.

I passed my shortwave ultraviolet lamp over the above stock page recently, and saw a result similar to the image in Figure 2. I noted to myself that these 22¢ Flags and (22¢) “D” PNCs were phosphor-tagged with block tagging, with untagged bands at the perforations to prevent abrasive taggant wear on the perforator pins. Further, 22¢ Flags have different block sizes, by which I had previously filed. This

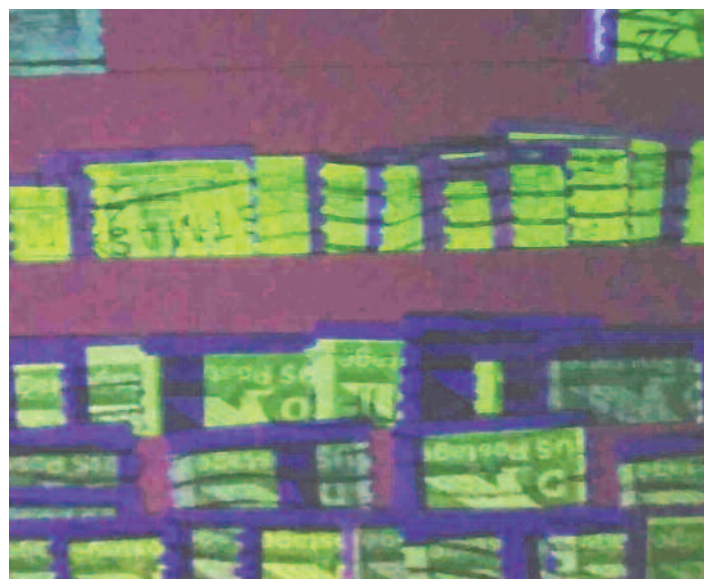

time I was only double-checking if I had missed any untagged errors.

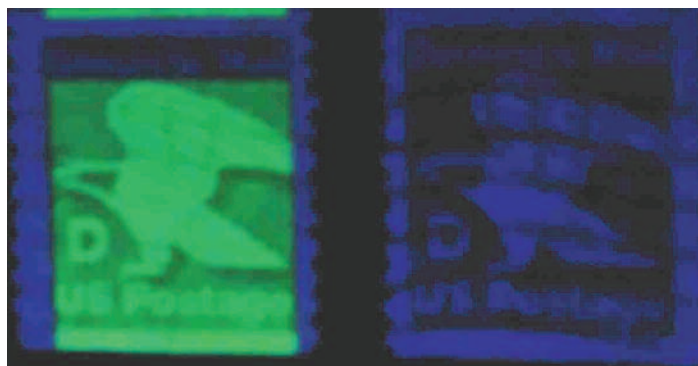

Seeing the same result as in prior checks, I was about to turn off the lamp when it occurred to me: I assumed the exposed parts of PNCs more narrowly overlapped, if untagged, meant the taggant was all behind the next coil. (Note in Figure 2 the middle stamps in the third row from bottom.) Shifting some coils with tongs, I found the D #1 untagged error shown in Figure 3 (which also shows a tagged #1).

In hindsight, I had believed that my overlapping wasn't too narrow to miss leaving some edge of block tagging. Because the D coils only have one block size, I hadn't individually checked them under SW-UV. This episode has taught me a new level of thoroughness.

The unnumbered untagged error has been known for some time; the Scott catalog number is 2112c. The PNC #1 version is listed in the PNC3 Values list as PNC-ID 1985-1.12. The 2014 edition has its market price at \$300 for a used single; no other format is valued.
