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FOP 66666 sale leads Linn's

The lead front page story in the March 22 issue of Linn's Stamp News follows up on Alan Thomson's "Snippets" column in the February Coil Line about the sale in December by member/dealer Jim Nelson of a rare Flag Over Porch die cut variety.

The article includes a front page color photo of an oncover example owned by member Dan Kauffinan. A black and white illustration is used on page 42 to accompany the portion of the story "jumped" inside the issue. Thomson, Nelson and Kauffinan are quoted heavily in the article.

Additional data on the Toy B11111 scarcity To the Editor:

In the March COIL LINE, W. McDonald's letter confirmed the scarcity of the PNC 37c Toy B11111 and you commented on the situation.

Maybe the following stats will add some substance to the discussion:

In utility covers picked up by me from my source on 11/28/03, 37,300; 12/26/03, 34,800; & 1/30/04, 34,000; totaling 106,100 pieces., I found 2,363 PNCs (31 different numbers), of which there were 238 Toys B12222 & only 3 Toys B11111.

It is safe to say that BIIIII toys are not too numerous! Also, that the PNC catalog prices of \$1.00 each used are not an indication of true value.

You also noted with amazement how few commemoratives are being used. I share your wonder. In all the covers reported here, only 3,521 (3.3 %) of them were used.

eBay seller explains why shipping costs needed To the Editor:

As an occasional seller of PNCs I noted with interest Bob Calotta's letter to the editor in the January 2004 Coil Line in which he describes the difficulty he has encountered doing sales of PNCs on eBay's auction Web site. As a part-time seller on eBay I have also had similar problems of short payments missing postage/handling charges. I would like to add a few comments in supprt of his letter justifying the postage/handling charge to buyers.

eBay offers a service to purchasers who do not have easy access to many different plate number combinations and varieties on the market. Bidders on eBay are hoping to find bargains and in most cases will pay less than 40 percent of retail list. I am mainly a reseller of PNCs that I have managed to purchase at a favorable price. Many of my customers are long term purchasers with me and I try to take care of them with prompt service and the best prices I can find.

When I list an item the terms of my sale are very specific in the description area eBay provides. I usually follow up the sale with a personel e-mail to the buyer outlining the purchase(s) with the postage/handling expense shown as a separate amount. I charge \$1.25 for a single purchase and reduce additional purchases from the same auction date by 60 cents per item (postage only). My postage/handling expense on a five-lot purchase would be \$3.85, not \$6.25.

What many buyers do not know is that eBay has an escalating table of fees, based upon the value assigned to the item, that is charged back to the seller at the time of listing. This listing fee is collected from the seller even if the item does not sell. At this writing the minimum listing fee is 35 cents for and item #10 or less. In addition to this fee when an item is sold, eBay then adds what they call a "Valus Added Fee" also based upon an escalating table of percentages. The more the item is purchased for the higher the fee eBay charges back to the seller. An finally, is a buyer uses eBays PayPal service to complete the purchase, eBay will charge another fee to the seller.

As an example of the fees collected by eBay, recently I sold a PNC5 for \$60. I was charged \$2.20 to list the item; \$2.28 Value Added Fee when the item sold; and \$1.58 for the PayPal transaction fee. My postage expense was \$1.67. (This buyer wanted insurance.) Total expense for the item was \$7.73. My postage/handling fee was \$2.30, charged to the buyer. I absorbed the other \$5.43 in eBay fees. On single lot purchases I usually clear a few cents that helps to offset the larger purchases.

So my thoughts to an eBay purchaser who objects to postage/handling would be: "Not All is as it may seem. Look between the lines for the unseen."



Sennett Flag Has Die Cut Fault

The recently released 37¢ Flag in 10 roll stick form from Sennett Security Products has been found with a significant fault in the serpentine die cutting. There are three cylinder combinations so far for this coil and the die fault seems to come only from \$2222, and may occur only in one row of the web. We don't know much about this stamp yet, but if history is any guide, it was probably printed by J. W. Fergusson & Son from 10 X 28 subject cylinders and processed by American Packaging. The peak count on this stamp is 12/11. The die fault consists of a break in the scrpentine line almost exactly at its mid point between top and bottom separators. The two ends that should be a continuous line pass each other then stop dead. This is best understood by examining the graphic depiction below, left. I have examined two separate strips of this and was surprised to find that they were not exactly the same. One came from Dr. Bob Kabinowitz and the other from George Ritter. One has a much larger space between the two line ends while the other requires a 4x lens to see The size of the break is not the only difference. The top and bottom segments of peaks on the large break type lie on parallel but offset straight lines. On the small break type the top six peaks and the bottom two peaks lie on the same straight line. The four peaks in-between lie on an angled line. The graphic on the right, below, illustrates this by use of lines only.



It's been suggested that the scrpentine line breaks are created by two parallel mats, one cutting the upper part of the web and the other the lower part, and they were not properly aligned. This doesn't stand up under scrutiny. Why would two mats be used to cut a 10 row wide web and create an almost insurmountable alignment problem? Further, why would the butting point of the two mats occur in the middle of a row of stamps? It's far more likely the fault is in the mat itself. The fact that there are two different types of break might indicate the faults) are in at least two different rows. We aren't going to know how many rows are involved until more reports are in and how common this oddity is. Examining a full stick of \$2222 might tell us which and how many rows are involved. I've checked two full sticks of \$3333 and found nothing. My strips of \$1111 are normal also.

BEP Flag 7777 Is 77*7

I was a little skeptical of this partial plate number when Joe Sedlvy sent it to me last August. It seemed more than an isolated ink pull-out when Jim Stollenwerk came up with another example in January of this year. The blue 7 is almost missing, with only a small part of the horizontal bar inked. A cropped photo is below.



37¢ Flag Miscut

Coil specialist and EFO collector George Ritter acquired the miscut BEP 37¢ Flag strip shown here, cropped. The plate number is unknown. It's clear the web was not properly aligned when it entered the die cutting phase and while it was sliced because the full die cuts are apparent, with the square corners at top and bottom of the each set of stamp pieces.



A Good Membership Year

Another report on the 'Toys'
To the Editor:

A few comments on the B11111 vs. B12222. In the last 2-3 years I went through over 920+ pounds of regular stamp mixtures through ads in *Linn's*. Stamp Collector, etc. I also buy from dealers and collectors. It took me a very short time to amass 1,000 B12222's. In that time I found about 50 B11111.

I only keep in stock 1,000 of each soaked plus 200 still on paper. I now have enough B12222's and pass them by in mixtures or as sent by collectors/dealers, but I still pull out B11111's and now have 145 total. Damaged not counted.

So, in my mixtures, etc, 5 percent would seem to be reasonable.

Very few were purchased from collector/dealers, but I do not keep records that detailed. This is from memory.

Update on 23c Geo. Wash.

To the Editor:

At the end of my "Die Cuts on the Avery 23c George Washington" article in the December 2003 Coil Line I noted "the theories may change as further information becomes available." Since then, two people have found rolls of the V35 with the "bell," which can only come from the second die cut mat design. In addition, I recently looked through about 25 rolls of the V35 and only found 2 PV rolls, which is also consistent with the second mat design.

In the chart near the end of my article I had placed the V35 in with the first mat design, but it is now clear that at least part of the V35 production was processed with the second mat design. The "bell" has also been found on the V21, which confirms that at least part of the V21 production was processed with the second mat design. It is possible that all of the numbers other that V11 and V22 were exclusively processed with the second mat design (the finding of a shallow valley on a number other than V11 or V22 would prove that wrong).

While my article only addressed the 23c GW, it appears that all of the 37c Egret coils have been processed with the second mat design.
